NEW YORK, June 29 (AP)—Ed McKeever, Notre Dame's newest football coach who is visiting here, tells how a kid from Vandergrift, Pa., wrote Frank Leahy a couple of years ago enclosing a sketch of Leahy he had drawn and asking for an autograph. Frank sent it, expressed the hope that the kid would some day realize his ambition to attend Notre Dame and forgot all about it. During spring drill this year McKeever, badly in need of a passer, tried almost everyone on the squad before he discovered that freshman Joe Gasparella listed as a center, really could throw that hoghide. Looking into the athletic department files to find Gasparella's background, McKeever found only the sketch of Leahy and Joe's letter.

Lanier Gets Two Losses In One Day

\$80,000 Netted For War Relief; Cubs Drop Dodgers Twice As Giants Lose

By JACK HAND (Associated Press Sports Writer) War relief picked up an estimated \$80,000 today from the first four major league fund games but chunky Max Lanier of the St. Louis Cardinals just picked up a check for two more black marks in the loss column. Lanier worked only six and two-thirds innings last night but he was beaten by the Phillies, 4-0, and charged with another 6-3 defeat in a continuation of a May 16 "suspended" game.

The largest crowd of the St. Louis season, 24,872, turned out for the novel doubleheader but Ken Raffensberger of the Phils spoiled their fun with a neat four-hit job in the regulation game after Charley Schanz picked up where he had left off in the "suspended" tilt to notch his sixth victory.

Bill Nicholson continued his mid-season rush toward the home run and runs batted in leadership by bashing his 13th and 14th circuit clouts and driving in five runs as Chicago whipped Brooklyn twice, 12-6 and 6-2 before 16,332 who paid \$15,887.99 into the war fund. Bob Chipman and Hank Wysz were the winners of Whit Wyatt and Hal Bregg.

The New York Giants' western trip started on a sour note as the Pittsburgh Pirates clubbed out a 9-2 edge for Max Butcher to hand Rube Fischer his sixth setback before 18,479 who dumped an estimated \$20,000 into the fund.

Dain Clay's 10th inning single in the opener and Estel Crabtree's pinch single in the nightcap gave Cincinnati a double-decker win over Boston, 4-3 and 3-2 behind Jim Konstanty and Arnold Carter. Al Javery and Nate Andrews were the Boston losers to the delight of 10,650 Cincy customers.

The Yankee stadium "jinx" struck down the St. Louis Browns who bowed before Atley Donald's talented curving, 7-2. Doc Muncreief's six-game win streak was snapped by the New Yorkers.

Don Black kept Philadelphia out of the American league cellar by scattering eight hits for win No. 5 by a 7-3 margin over Cleveland's Vern Kennedy and Washington's Niggeling turned back Detroit with three scratchy hits to decision Rufe Gentry, 4-1, and dump the Tigers into seventh place.

Manager Joe Cronin's seventh inning double earned Boston a 4-3 twilight edge over Chicago, giving Joe Bowman his sixth win and Orval Grove his sixth setback.

OAKLAND, Calif., June 29 (AP)—Jack Chase, 160, Denver, sent a smashing blow into the right eye of Aaron (Little Tiger) Wade, 163, San Francisco, to score a tenth and final round technical knockout last night. Bevos Beat Oaks; Return To Second

Ducks Score Six Runs In Ninth; Seals Wallop Padres Out of Number Two Spot

By The Associated Press The Beavers were back in second place in the coast league pennant standings today as the result of a 6 to 0 beating handed the Oakland Acorns last night.

The San Francisco Seals, held on to first place, having walloped the San Diego Padres out of the runner-up berth.

The Beavers jolted the Acorns with a six-run ninth inning after the two squads had battled without scoring for the previous eight innings. Roy Hessler pitched a three-hitter for Portland.

The Seals collected 15 hits off three Padre pitchers for a 10 to 4 victory, tying the series at one each. The loss left San Diego one percentage point behind Portland.

Seattle and Los Angeles split a doubleheader, leaving both tied for fourth spot with Hollywood, which lost to Sacramento. Los Angeles took the opener with Seattle, 5 to 3, but dropped the nightcap, 4 to 3, on Al Libke's two-run homer with two out in the seventh.

At Sacramento the Solons were behind 5 to 6 when Catcher Jim Steiner poled out a triple with the bases loaded in the seventh to give his team its 8 to 6 win over Hollywood.

First Semi-Finals Tennis Match Today

EVANSTON, Ill., June 29 (AP) Charlie Sampson, sole tourney survivor of Notre Dame's team that finished the regular season undefeated, will try to salvage some prestige for the Irish today when he tackles Harry Likas, Gonzaga freshman, in the first semi-final match of the NCAA tennis championship at Northwestern university.

Two quarter-finals doubles matches, interrupted by rain yesterday, also are scheduled today. One pits Frank Willett and Howard McCall of Georgia Tech against Nick Buzzell and Gary Rubby of Pepperdine college (Los Angeles), while the other pairs off Sampson and Jerry Everet of Notre Dame against George Drulliner and Arnold Besser of College of the Pacific.

Sampson emerged from the singles quarter-finals yesterday with a 6-2, 6-3 triumph over McCall. Likas advanced to today's round by downing Buzolich, 6-3, 6-1.

Defending Champion Francisco (Pancho) Segura of Ecuador and the University of Miami (Fla.) will meet Willett tomorrow in the other singles semi-finals. Doubles semi-finals also will be played Friday with finals in both competition set for Saturday.

Segura rombed to 6-1, 6-3 victories over Stan Clark of California Tech yesterday, while Willett won his quarter-final match from John Hickman of Texas university, 6-4, 6-3.

STOCKHOLM, June 29 (AP)—Arne Andersson, who smashed a lot of Gunder Haegg's world records while Haegg was in America last summer, now can boast his first victory over his famous countryman. They met for the first time in two years yesterday and Andersson won a 1500 meter duel in 3:48.8, nearly four seconds slower than his own world mark. Haegg's time was 3:50.2.
