

COMMANDERS WARN AGAINST JOB SLACKERS

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—The nation's top military commanders put war job slackers in a class with deserters and over-optimism at home, they say, is threatening to prolong the war.

In a special report to President Roosevelt, the heads of the army, navy and air forces last night deplored what they termed an over-confident state of mind on the home front and declared that "any slackening in the needed production will only delay ultimate victory."

The report was signed by Gen. George C. Marshall, chief of staff; Admiral Ernest J. King, top navy chief, and Gen. H. H. Arnold, head of the air forces.

The three military chiefs visited London and the French front shortly after the allies made the successful drive across the English channel. Their report to the president was their first word on the home-front reaction to what they termed "the recent favorable course of the fighting."

The production might of American industry and labor, they said, is virtual assurance of eventual victory, but they warned:

"This (victory) depends, however, on a continuance of the full support now given to the fighting forces by the home front."

"The battles now in progress entail heavy losses in material which American industry must replace, and any slackening in the needed production will only delay ultimate victory. No effort required in the home-front battle should be diverted by any element in the production machine—whether it be owner-ship, management, rank-and-file workers or those in the service of the government itself."

They said recent victories have "persuaded some people that the war is as good as won, and that accordingly they can throw up their jobs and go back to civilian life."

"No doubt most of the men at the front would also like easier and better paid peacetime jobs," they added, "but they are sticking to the jobs they have now."

Delegates to Urge FDR-Willkie Ticket

PORTLAND, June 30 (AP)—Rev. Charles T. McPherson, Oregon delegate to the Democratic National convention, will recommend a coalition Roosevelt-Willkie ticket for the 1944 presidential campaign.

The retired Portland Methodist minister said he would urge the plan at the Chicago convention.

Lumber Production Falls During April

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—Lumber production in April fell 8.2 per cent under the amount produced during the same month in 1943, and 2.4 per cent under March production, the war production board announced.

Production for the month was estimated at 2,681,649,000 board feet.

FDR SIGNS PRICE STABILIZATION ACT

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—President Roosevelt signed today the bill continuing the price and wage stabilization act for another year, to June 30, 1945.

Given final senate and house passage June 21 after a long legislative wrangle over various phases of price control policy, the new law makes several major changes in present pricing, regulatory and enforcement procedures. Administration spokesmen declare, however, that it retains adequate safeguards against inflationary price and wage trends.

One of the principal changes directs OPA to adjust ceilings on "major" textile items to reflect a parity price for raw cotton. Defined officially as applying to 80 per cent of all textiles, this represented an administration compromise to cotton state legislators who had campaigned for a more liberal price formula guaranteeing also manufacturing costs and a profit to millers.
