

8 FATALITIES REPORTED IN STATE IN JUNE

SALEM, June 30 (AP)—There were eight fatalities reported among the 1123 industrial accidents in Oregon during the week ended yesterday, the state industrial accident commission said today.

Fatalities were:
Oscar Lucas, Bend laborer, injured June 6; William F. Reed, Bend rollerman, injured June 6; Ralph C. Turner, Bend flagman, injured June 6; Francis W. West, Klamath Falls truck driver, injured June 14; D. S. Gates, Corvallis laborer, injured May 3; I. M. Wayne, Grants Pass laborer, injured March 18; Vesper D. Groves, Florence choker setter, injured June 5, and J. L. Salverria, Portland laborer, injured May 11.

BOYS STATE ELECTS OFFICERS FROM HERE

Two Klamath boys were elected to state offices at the Beaver Boys' State meeting in Corvallis this week, according to word received here.

The boys were Dan Brown, who was elected a senator, and Steve Stone, who was chosen a representative.
Several other boys from here were elected to city offices. Daniel Brown was chosen mayor of one of the fictitious cities. Steve Stone, Charles Heilbronner and Clarence Bussman were elected councilmen for several different cities, and John Heilbronner was chosen recorder for one of the cities.

NEGROES MAY MAKE PORTLAND HOME

PORTLAND, June 30 (AP)—Dr. A. LeRoy Locke, negro author and educator, estimated today that a third of Portland's war-brought negro populace will become permanent residents.

The Harvard graduate and former Rhodes scholar, here to study living conditions of this area's 15,000 negroes, cited housing and equality in job opportunities as two of the principal post-war problems.

"New York has set a good example by employing negroes in virtually all of its municipal services, including school teaching, with excellent results," Locke said. "That should eventually be established throughout the country. Negroes should be recognized for their abilities, just as white people."

Growers Face Picker Shortage

OREGON CITY, June 30 (AP)—Growers face a shortage of about 800 cane berry pickers in this area at the season's peak when 1400 workers will be needed, the farm labor office said today.

Favorable spring weather resulted in one of the heaviest crops on record.

Group Recommends Barring Japs From Pacific Coast

SACRAMENTO, Calif., June 30 (AP)—A committee headed by Mayor Earl Riley of Portland recommended to the western conference of mayors today that Japanese-Americans remain barred from the Pacific coast for the duration.

Riley's resolutions committee also demanded federal payment as a substitute for taxes on land removed from tax rolls for federal use.

SPRAGUE RIVER TOPS BOND QUOTA

Sprague River bond buyers came through in a big way this week, going over the top in their Fifth War Loan quota and continuing purchases beyond the set objective.

The town quota was \$7500. By today, sales had reached \$7950, with Mrs. Anna Wolford and Mrs. Reynolds directing the campaign.

Employees of the American Box company were asked to buy \$3400, but had bought \$3500 in bonds by today, according to Manager Peter Cowbrough, who had charge of the campaign there.

Lee McMullen, chairman for the Sprague River and Bly districts, warmly praised the bond buyers and bond salesmen of Sprague River.

CENTENARIAN DIES

PORTLAND, June 29 (AP)—Funeral services will be held Friday for Mrs. Littie Bell, 100, who died here yesterday. She was born in Canada and had lived here since 1913. Survivors include two nieces, Mrs. Helen Carter and Mrs. James Emlaw, both of Portland.

LT. BEATTY NEW SUBSTATION HEAD

Lt. Kay Beatty, WAC who has been on duty at the headquarters office in Portland for the past eight months has been placed in charge of the sub-station at Klamath Falls. Her territory will include the lower part of South-Central Oregon.

Lt. Beatty has been serving as public relations and liaison officer in the Portland area and for a time was in charge of the Vancouver, Washington district. Her home is in Chicago, Illinois and she has been in the women's army corps for 18 months. She was commissioned April 3, 1943.

At the time of her enlistment into the WAC, Lt. Beatty was working for the department of agriculture in Chicago. Stationed with Lt. Beatty at Klamath Falls will be T/4 Clara Reynolds.

Funeral Services Set For Doctor

NEWPORT, June 30 (AP)—Funeral services for Dr. Gertrude Minthorn, 62, Newport physician and cousin of former President Herbert Hoover, will be held here Monday. She died Wednesday.

She was the daughter of the late Dr. Henry J. Minthorn, founder of the Pacific academy here, which was attended by Hoover when he was a boy.

New Policy Made For Paratroopers

FORT LEWIS, June 30 (AP)—Authorities at the army service forces training center here announced today that the war department has adopted a new policy of accepting volunteers from all branches of the army, for the parachute troops.

Since last fall, applications had been accepted only from personnel at infantry and artillery replacement training centers, the announcement stated, but under the new policy physically qualified officers and enlisted men under 32 years of age in other army ground forces organizations, or army air forces or army service forces units are eligible for transfer, with the exception of certain highly skilled men in critical assignments.

FIRECRACKERLESS FOURTH IN STORE

This will be another Fourth of July without the crackle of firecrackers.

Klamath fire protective officials today reminded merchants and the general public that by proclamation of the governor, sale or use of firecrackers and other pyrotechnics is forbidden without a permit from the civilian defense council.

This proclamation was issued June 30, 1943, and renewed in May, 1944, to cover this summer season.

SCARLET FEVER ON INCREASE IN STATE

There are 25 more cases of scarlet fever this week than there were for the corresponding week of 1943, according to the Health Bulletin released this week by the Oregon state board of health.

In addition to the 35 cases of scarlet fever, 54 new cases of measles or German measles, were reported. Klamath county reported four new cases of measles, three new cases of whooping cough and one new case of syphilis.

Canned Goods Go On Ration List

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—The ration point holiday on purchases of canned tomatoes, peas and asparagus comes to an end at midnight tomorrow, foreboding

owing the return of other vegetables to the ration list.

Announcing processed food point values for the period from next Sunday through July 29, the office of price administration said today that it had "clearly foreseen" and predicted that ration-free vegetables would be re-assigned point values when the 1943 pack had been moved off store shelves.

Peas and tomatoes go back on the ration chart at five points for popular sized cans, while asparagus will require 10 points.

Same thing was tried in eight provinces in Canada and in Norway, Sweden, Finland and Russia but it was an admitted failure and universally abandoned.
