

SUMMER CAMP SLATED FOR 4-H MEMBERS

The eighth annual 4-H summer camp will be held at the organization camp site area, at Lake of the Woods from July 30 to August 12, indicates George Peters, 4-H club agent. Girls week will be July 30 to August 5 and boys week will be August 6 to August 12 inclusive.

Because of limited facilities, there will be just enough camp accommodations for 85 girls and 85 boys at camp this year, Peters said. Four-H club members of nine years of age or older may attend the camp either on scholarships or by paying their own way. Members with scholarships will be given priority over those who pay their own way if the 85 limitation is reached. Reservations for those awarded scholarships will be held open until July 7 and after that anyone who has been in club work, or who is in club work at the present time, may register.

As various educational activities and instructions are offered for these 4-H club girls and boys, a reliable and efficient staff has been obtained for these two weeks of camp. Peters stated. Four of the older 4-H club members will also be present acting as counselors to assist in taking the groups through their respective programs, to handle camp fire programs, and to work with the campers in their living quarters.

Some of the activities offered for these boys and girls are rifle marksmanship (if possible), leather craft, braiding craft, stenciling, spatter painting, nature study including tree identification, swimming instructions and various other educational activities to participate in. Above all the cooking staff will see that each club member attending camp will have plenty of good food to eat.

Letters and enclosed cards have been mailed out to all 4-H club members, giving them a defined outline of the camp activities and important instructions on how to enroll for 4-H summer camp.

"It is essential that the importance of this camp be stressed as there is an ardent need for this type of education particularly during periods of stress and war, which the world is undergoing at the present time," according to Peters.

BOY BORROWS HORSE TO GET FARM JOB

A 15-year-old boy from upper Willamette valley, who had come to Klamath Falls to earn his living, is in juvenile custody here after he had "borrowed" a horse to practice riding so that he could get a job on a farm.

Therman Johnson, who lives near the Weyerhaeuser junction, early Thursday morning noticed that his horse was missing. He notified the sheriff's office and then set out to search for himself. A short time later he and a deputy sheriff found the 15-year-old leading the lost horse towards Keno.

The boy told juvenile authorities that a few days ago he decided that his parents shouldn't have to support him any more and he left home to get a job on a farm. Arriving in Klamath Falls, he decided that perhaps he would have to know how to ride in order to hold down a ranch job so he borrowed the first available horse he could find to get a little experience. The youth is held here pending the arrival of his parents.

FDR Signs Eight Money Bills

WASHINGTON, June 30 (AP)—President Roosevelt today signed eight appropriations bills totaling \$19,317,322,000, including \$15,434,814,000 for war department military establishments.

The other appropriations measures included labor department and federal security, \$1,112,644,000; war agencies, \$1,030,937,000; deficiencies and supplements, \$762,491,000; state, justice and commerce departments, \$241,937,000; agriculture, \$562,145,000; interior department, \$103,239,000; and District of Columbia, \$69,111,000.

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28 AWARDS GIVEN FOR GALLANT ACTION

SUPREME HEADQUARTERS ALLIED EXPEDITIONARY FORCE, June 30 (AP)—Twenty-eight awards for gallant action under heavy fire have been presented to officers and enlisted men of the American second division which bore the brunt of two weeks of heavy fighting in the Cerisy forest sector in the early stage of the invasion of France.

Nine Silver Stars and 19 Bronze Stars were given to men many of whom, according to a field dispatch, went far beyond their duty in making the second division drive one of the epics of the invasion.

Recipients of the Silver Stars included Lt. Col. Jack K. Norris, Payette, Idaho.
