

GOP CONCLAVE PLANNED BY PARTY HEADS

ALBANY, N. Y., July 4 (AP)—Governor Thomas E. Dewey indicated today he may travel with in the next month to a conference with other republican governors on presidential campaign plans.

Avoiding comment on national issues, the GOP nominee told a news conference he doubted that he would make any speeches soon.

He said, however, that he had discussed the possibility of a meeting with the other 25 republican governors, including Governor John W. Bricker of Ohio, the vice presidential nominee.

Dewey said no definite plans for such a meeting had been made but that he talked it over informally with Governor Earl Warren of California after Dewey's nomination at the Chicago republican convention last week.

Personally, Dewey said, he would like to stay in Albany for the next two months, spending weekends at his farm near Pawling. He added, however, that "I may have to travel some in the next month."

Republican campaign headquarters will be opened Wednesday in the Roosevelt hotel in New York City, Dewey disclosed, adding that it was the "Theodore Roosevelt hotel."

Dewey said his weekends at Pawling would be devoted largely to study and to writing speeches. He had no plans, he said, to receive political visitors there.

The governor will work the fourth of July in the mansion, with no visitors on his schedule. He will go to Pawling Friday, where a reception by the townspeople is planned that afternoon. Pawling has a population of about 1200.

The nominee declined to comment on questions dealing with the possibility of eliminating foreign policy as a campaign issue and said he had not studied the effect of severance of relations by this government with Finland.

He turned aside a query as to reasons why Governor Warren declined to enter the contest or the vice presidential nomination before Bricker was chosen.

Asked about the selection of a republican United States senatorial candidate in New York, Dewey said he thought "the party will pick its own ticket."

WAR BOND SALES MOVE WITHIN GOAL

WASHINGTON, July 4 (AP)—Sales in the Fifth War Loan drive moved within sight of the \$16,000,000,000 goal today.

The treasury reported that sales through Saturday were 92 per cent of the quota, although sales to individuals continued to lag.

Sales to corporations and other non-banking investors totaled \$11,078,000,000, 111 per cent of the quota for these investors.

Sales to individuals reached \$3,607,000,000, 60 per cent of this quota.

The new total represented an increase of \$957,000,000, from the preceding day.

The drive, which opened June 12, will close Saturday.

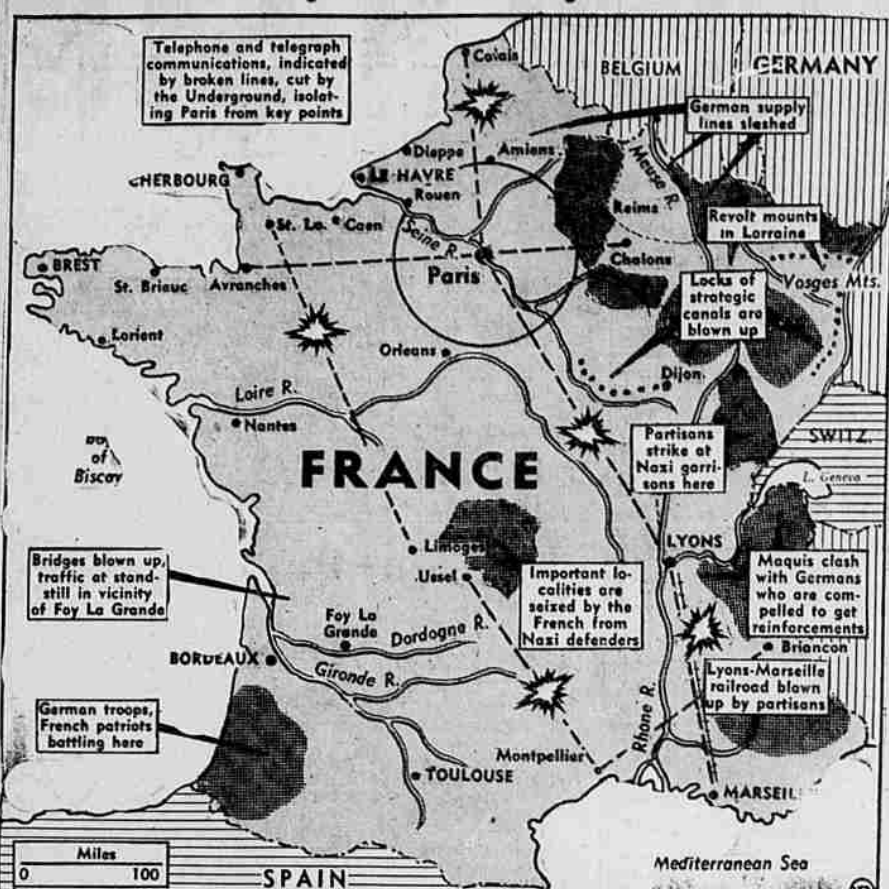
Dianne Davis, 4, and her brother, Kenneth, 6, were carried in a blanket from the house, which was destroyed by the flames. Their parents had left for work.

Train Wreck Boosts Deaths Over Fourth of July to 317

Death of five persons early today in an Arizona train wreck boosted the nation's toll of fatalities over the Independence Day weekend to 317.

Although the mounting figure exceeded that of last year by a small margin, it remained far below the 1000 accidental deaths total which the national council of safety estimated for the four-day holiday weekend.

Traffic accidents, despite restrictions on gasoline and tires, were the primary cause of death, with 138 victims. Eighty-five persons drowned and 94 succumbed to miscellaneous causes.

Illinois held first place in accidental deaths with 27, California next with 21, followed by Pennsylvania with 17. The largest number of deaths from traffic accidents was 14 in California.

Meanwhile, transportation officials expected a record-breaking volume of traffic tonight as excursionists return home. Railroad officials in New York said they estimated the rush would

Box Plant Burns In \$200,000 Fire

LONGVIEW, July 4 (AP)—The box plant of the Pacific Paperboard company on the Cowlitz river here was destroyed by fire this morning, with Manager E. E. Flood estimating the loss at \$200,000, covered by insurance.

The flames raged for five hours and threatened the remainder of the factory before being controlled.

Firemen said that six machines, each valued at \$20,000 or more, are regarded as a total loss. Destroyed in addition to the building and machinery was stock valued at \$25,000.

HIRABAYASHI FREE AFTER INDICTMENT

SPOKANE, July 4 (AP)—Gordon K. Hirabayashi, 26-year-old Japanese American, was freed today on \$1000 bond after his arrest and arraignment on a federal indictment charging he failed to fill out and return a selective service questionnaire.

He told reporters he would be glad to serve in the Pacific as a neutral doing relief work but could not bear arms because of his membership in the Society of Friends.

He said he did not plan to bring a test suit in the present case as he did unsuccessfully in his fight against the Japanese evacuation from the west coast.

He refused to return the form, he said, because of its racial inquiries.
