SEC REJECTS FOUR ORGANIZATION PLANS

PORTLAND, Ore., July 5 (AP)—Trustees of Portland Electric Power company declared today they were "not surprised" by the securities exchange commission's rejection of four reorganization plans.

The SEC announced at Philadelphia yesterday that none of the plans had been found fair to both bondholders and stockholders, and set a 60-day period for filing of amended proposals. Trustees, who now operate the company under the jurisdiction of the federal court, turned attention to their request for a valuation of the company's assets. The SEC's announcement yesterday bypassed the trustees' evaluation of approximately \$35,000,000, setting a value at the end of 1942 as about \$22,275,000.

The federal court will hear trustees' petition for a valuation hearing here next Monday.

MEXICANS ARRIVE—EUGENE, July 5 (AP)—Thirty-five Mexican laborers arrived here over the weekend to aid in the farm harvest. The group was the first of the Lane county quota of 163 Mexican nationals. They will live in a camp at the county fairgrounds here.

BOARD AGREES TO TRANSFER OF JAPS

SALEM, July 5 (AP)—The state board of control today reluctantly agreed to transfer of three Japanese insane patients, who had been moved out of Oregon by the war relocation authority, from an Idaho State hospital at Pendleton.

The board felt that the federal government should take care of them, but consented to the transfer because of the agreement whereby northwest states transfer insane persons to the states in which they have legal residence. The federal government will pay Oregon \$1.20 a day for the care of each of the Japanese for the duration of the war. Two of the patients had lived in Portland and the other at Hillsboro.

Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell, Jr., said that the best way to solve the problem would be to "take those Japs out and shoot 'em." While State Treasurer Leslie M. Scott said "I don't suppose our marines on Saipan would think very favorably of our action."

Governor Earl Snell said the board had to approve the transfer "as a matter of reciprocity between the states."
