

EICHER OUSTS LAWYER FROM SEDITION CASE

WASHINGTON, July 6 (AP)—Chief Justice Eicher of District Columbia federal court dismissed defense attorney James Laughlin from the mass sedition conspiracy case today after failing to account for attorneys filing the badge of a so-called "Eicher Contempt Club." Laughlin, representing two of the 29 defendants, filed a petition with the speaker of the House Saturday asking the impeachment of Justice Eicher. Laughlin's dismissal was ordered at the close of a two-hour discussion by Justice Eicher of grievances which some defense attorneys have aired in various ways.

Justice Eicher also ordered Eugene M. Sanctuary, to return to the trial immediately. He had absented himself and filed a motion asking leave to withdraw from the case.

The court accepted the explanation of Albert Dilling, attorney for Sanctuary, that he intended to file a motion for contempt in devious ways. Some attorneys who wear the ribbon under their lapels had said privately that the letters stood for "Eicher Contempt Club," with a membership of defense attorneys who have been fined by the justice.

Justice Eicher said he was willing to end that "incident at this point," but he took a more serious view of the impeachment petition. He called on Laughlin to show cause why he should not be dismissed as counsel in the case and denied further participation in the trial.

"Any citizen has the right to petition for impeachment," Laughlin responded. "Your honor without power at this time to interfere."

"Is that all you have to say?" the court asked.

Laughlin said that it was. Then you are dismissed from this case as attorney of record in this case," Justice Eicher said, "and the order of the court is that you be denied further participation in this trial."

Laughlin said he would ask the court of appeals to review the order.

The court then adjourned until tomorrow morning.

British Subs Sink Supply Ships

LONDON, July 6 (AP)—British submarines have sunk nine supply ships and damaged two others during recent patrols in far eastern waters, the admiralty announced today.

They also bombarded enemy shore installations at Lhoé Seumawo on the northern coast of Sumatra and Ross Island off Malaya.

AMBASSADOR TO TURKEY RETURNS

WASHINGTON, July 6 (AP)—Laurence A. Steinhardt, American ambassador to Turkey, is on his way home for consultations but the state department said his return involved no question of relations between the United States and Turkey.

The state department explained Steinhardt was coming home on leave. The statement was given after an Ankara dispatch last night told of his departure from that capital. The same dispatch said Sterndale Bennett, minister and first counselor of the British embassy at Ankara, also had been called home and would leave soon.

Recreation Camp Sign-Up Open to 100 Klamath Boys

Registration is now underway for the annual Boys' Camp, which is sponsored by the city recreation committee. Dave Bridge, recreation officer has announced.

The camp will be open from August 13 to August 20, and will be limited to 100 boys over seven years of age. Only the first hundred boys to register will be allowed to go, Bridge said. A charge of \$9 will be made for the entire week. The money must be presented at the time of registration, Bridge emphasized. No ration points will be required this year.

The camp is at the Lake of the Woods. Transportation will be furnished by two school buses. Campers should bring their own bedding, towels, soap, toothbrush, etc. Sleeping quarters will be provided and there will be three cooks on hand, Bridge said.

Most of the time at the camp will be spent swimming, boating, fishing, hiking and horseback riding. Prospective campers may register at the recreation office, the swimming pool, the high school and Mills school.

STALIN HOPES FOR DEMOCRATIC POLAND

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., July 6 (AP)—Marshal Josef Stalin has expressed the desire for "a strong, independent, democratic Poland," friendly with Russia, according to the Rev. Stanislaus Orlemanski, pastor of Our Lady of the Rosary church, who recently conferred with the Russian premier.

The priest released for publication a written statement given him by Andrzej Witos, leader of the Polish peasant parties. The statement was based on declarations made by Marshal Stalin at a conference with leaders of the Polish army in the Kremlin at Moscow last March 15.

The Witos statement quoted Stalin as saying: "We will help you organize the Polish army and we will not hesitate to supply you with the best equipment. Our army will liberate the Polish people from Hitlerism and fascism."

"We will not do this for the sake of appearances or because we are brother Slavs but because sound political judgment shows that as neighbors we are necessary, one to another."
