Camp White Yanks Get Return Game With Bolstered Sailors

Two Scoring Records Set By Top U. S. Golf Teams

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., July 7 (AP)—With two scoring records being set in as many days, the Golden Valley course, a 6582-yard championship layout, has taken the beating of its life and appeared doomed for more par-busting today as some of the country's top pros drew beads on a double round of best-ball team competition.

In yesterday's first round of the 126-hole marathon, which concludes Sunday with the winning twosome splitting a first prize of \$1600 in war bonds, a total of 62 birdies and four eagles were posted by the eight competing teams.

Leading the way was the favored Jug McSpaden-Byron Nelson powerhouse with a best ball of 31-30—81 as compared with par 37-36—73. They fashioned this phenomenal score—an all-time team record for par—breaking—despite a high wind and a rain which pelted their faces for the last eight holes.

McSpaden, winner of five of his last 13 tournaments, carried the match most of the way. After taking a bogey six on the first hole when he knocked two balls out of bounds, he dropped a 40-foot chip shot on the 498-yard sixth for an eagle. This started him on a sensational streak during which he went 10 under par on nine consecutive holes.

McSpaden-Nelson, runner-up for the 1943 Golden Valley title, beat Pvt. Chick Harbert and Mike Turnesa 4-up in their first test of the round robin matches. This gave them a plus-four rating in the scoring system and a tie for the lead with Bill Kaiser-Bob Hamilton, another hot-shooting duo which

authored a best-ball 64 in disposing of the local entry of Les Bolstad-Joe Coria 4-up.

Hamilton, the 1944 north-south champion from Evansville, Ind., eagled the first hole with a seven-foot putt and had an actual 66 for the trip — equalling the competitive course record made Wednesday by Toney Penna in the pro-woman attraction.

Plus-one advantages were held by Jimmy Hines-Willie Goggin with a best-ball of 65, and Lieut. Ben Hogan and Penna with a 63.

Weekend Fishing Prospects

PORTLAND, July 7 (AP)—Weekend anglers will have the best luck in the Portland area and in Jackson and Josephine counties, a report by the Oregon game commission indicated today.

The report: PORTLAND AND VICINITY
Columbia county, fair for trout; Nehalem river, good results on spinner and fly; slough and diked districts from Prescott to Woodson, spiny rayed fish are being taken in limit catches.

TILLAMOOK COUNTY—The Tillamook, Trask, Wilson, Nestucca, Little Nestucca and the Nehalem rivers have yielded fair catches of trout; other streams poor.

LINCOLN—Fair catches from the Siletz and Five Rivers on flies and spinners; trolling in tidewater very poor; fishing for catfish, perch, bluegill and bass good in Devils lake.

CURRY—Generally poor in the northern section, few good catches in Floras and Garrison lakes; in the south a few catches reported from Winchuck river.

JACKSON—Generally good, in rivers, streams and lakes. JOSEPHINE—Considerably improved over last week, good catches from larger streams on flies, and limit trout catches from Bolan lake.

MORROW—Poor to fair. GILLIAM—Poor in all larger streams, fair in smaller streams. WHEELER—Only fair in all streams.

DESCHUTES—Fair, weather condition unsettled; roads to all lakes good; limit catches reported at Sparks lake, and Paulina and East lakes trolling.

CROOK—Very poor conditions for the last week. JEFFERSON—Metolius river yielding fair catches on flies; some good catches reported at Suttle and Blue lakes.

Reds, Boston Hot; Dodgers Freezing

Redlegs Hand Bums Tenth Loss In Row; Giants Give Cards Their Worst Lacing

Boston is the current hot club of the American league, and Cincinnati is running a fever temperature in the National, but there isn't any doubt today about the temperature of the Brooklyn Dodgers. It's a sub-zero minus 10 for one of the longest losing streaks of the 1944 season.

The Flatbush flock hasn't won since leaving the banks of the Gowanus, and needs only four more setbacks in the weekend series with Pittsburgh to tie the all-time Brooklyn record of 14, a disaster that befell Burchleigh Grimes' warriors in 1937. They still have three to go to equal the Cubs' 13-game flop of early season.

Three defeats by Chicago, three more by St. Louis and now four more by Cincinnati, is the Brooklyn road record, following Bucky Walters' 14th victory of the season last night when he hurled Cincinnati to a 10-4 triumph at the expense of Rookie Ralph Braica. It was the ninth Redleg win in the last 10 starts and Walters' sixth in a row. Ray Mueller of Cincy set a new consecutive game catching record at 134, with 636 Muellers in the stands as guests of the management.

Joe Cronin's Red Sox continued to stick on the heels of the St. Louis Browns in the American by taking a 13-3 walkover from Detroit as Tex Hughson notched his No. 13 over Rufe Gentry. Boston has won eight of 12 since returning to Fenway park. Bob Johnson hit for the cycle with a single, double, triple and homer and Bobby Doerr batted in five runs with a perfect 4 for 4 days.

Bob Muncrief protected the Browns' 24-game margin by shutting out Philadelphia with four hits, 6-0, with the help of Vern Stephens' 3-run homer. Woody Wheaton, who started the season as an outfielder, lost his first pitching start for the Mackmen.

Hank Borowy of the Yankees tuned up for a probable all-star appearance by whitewashing Cleveland on a four-hitter, 4-0, to decision Mel Harder with Mike Mosevich and Mike Garback showing the way. Mickey Haefner of Washington turned back Chicago with the third American league four-hitter to earn a 5-0 edge over Orval Grove.
