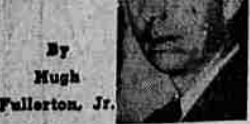


Sports Briefs

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., July 8 (AP)—With 72 holes yet to be played in the toughest tournament grind of the season, four teams had forged into contention today for the championship of the \$10,000 Gold Valley best-ball competition.

The favorite twosome of Jug McSpaden-Byron Nelson and the surprising entry of Bill Kaiser-Bob Hamilton were locked for the lead entering another grueling double round today, each with a plus five count. This method of scoring meant that they had won five holes from three opposing teams in the round-robin affair in the last two days—a remarkable low winning margin in match play competition such as this.

Seals, Oaks Trade First Place Again

Seattle, defeated 2 to 1 by Portland, dropped out of its second place tie with San Francisco to third spot. San Diego, while dropping a 2 to 1 match to last-place Sacramento, was in fourth position.

Los Angeles lashed seven Hollywood pitchers for 19 hits to defeat the Stars, 11 to 8, and climb over their cross-town rivals for fifth place honors. Portland's triumph came when John O'Neil and Mel Nunes, Beaver keystone combination, teamed at the plate in the ninth inning. O'Neil slashed a single to left, moved up on Eddie Adams' sacrifice, and came home on Nunes' long single to left center with no marino Pieretti, Portland hurler, it was his 13th win of the season.

Pep Scores Joyce Decision

CHICAGO, July 8 (AP)—Whirlwind Willie Pep of Hartford, Conn., judging by the fistic lesson he gave Willie Joyce last night, is primed to add the lightweight title to the featherweight crown he officially wears in New York.

Pep fanned his amazing ring record to 74 wins in 75 scraps by brilliantly boxing to an unanimous 10-round decision over Joyce, formidable Gary, Ind., lightweight, before 10,113 fans at Comiskey park.

The cat-quick Pep won all except three rounds from Joyce whom he spotted more than six pounds. The Gary negro, who won two triumphs over Hammerin' Henry Armstrong, weighed in at 134 while Pep scaled 127 1/2.

Castoffs Stop Former Bosses

Pirates Wallop Hapless Burns As Cards Lose Again; Yankees Win Over Detroit

By JACK HAND (Associated Press Sports Writer) Haunting the old homestead is a favorite pastime of baseball castoffs and Fritz Ostermueller, Nate Andrews and Joe Heving today have the last laugh on the Brooklyn Dodgers, St. Louis Cardinals and Boston Red Sox who once turned them out in the cold world.

Ostermueller is the most celebrated case as it was on Decoration Day that Branch Rickey sold him down stream to Syracuse. A series of mysterious business deals involving a threat of "I'll take it to Landis" resulted in Fritz donning a Pittsburgh uniform in which he has won 3 of 4 including yesterday's 13-2 slaughter of his old Dodger mates.

Rickey is mixed up in the Andrews vs. St. Louis Cardinals "feud" because he was boss man of the farm system that nurtured Nate for six years before letting him go to the Browns for the waiver price in 1939.

Back up in the nations by way of Syracuse a year ago, Andrews stopped the Cards, 10-5, last night for the second time this year although he had to get help in the ninth. When the Red Birds lose two in a row it's a story but they're still 9 1/2 games in front of Cincinnati.

Heving has been back and forth between Boston and Cleveland so many times that he can't hold a grudge, but he did beat his old Red Sox pals, 8-5, in a relief chore for Steve Gromek. Mike Ryba was the loser although a rookie Red Barrett struck out seven men in a 3 2/3 inning stretch.

Luke Sewell's Browns still hold a 2 1/2 game lead on Boston although they were shut out, 7-0 by Milo Candini of Washington as Stan Pence emerged from a slump at Jack Kramer's expense. The Nats, in the cellar two weeks ago, now are back in fourth place.

New York is knocking on the door again, only a game back of second place Boston after Ernie Bonham's 3-1 triumph over Detroit, a team they have beaten only twice in eight starts. Stubby Overmire couldn't check the Yanks. Lum Harris pitched his farewell game before entering the service and scattered 12 hits so thinly he tossed Philadelphia to a 4-3 nod over Chicago's Jake Wade.

Philadelphia and Washington's night games were the first of eight war fund tilts in the American League, approximately \$27,000.

Mel Ott was hot with seven hits in eight at bats as his New York Giants grabbed the second game from Chicago, 6-2 behind Frank Seward after Ace Adams had bowed to Hank Wyse, 3-2 in the opener. Charley Schanz of the Phils beat Cincinnati, 3-2 on Coaker Triplett's two-run double in the sixth.

Haegg Slices 1500 Meter Record

GOTHENBURG, Sweden, July 8 (AP)—Gunder Haegg, famous track runner, broke his second world record of the season yesterday by running the 1500 meters in 3:43, two seconds faster than the previous mark of 3:45 established last year by his countryman, Arne Andersson. Less than two weeks ago on June 25, Haegg set a world mark by running the two mile in 8:46.4.

Three-Year-Old to Clinch Turf Title

NEW YORK, July 8 (AP)—Unless there is an upset, Alfred Parker's By Jimmy can cement his claim to the 1944 three-year-old turf championship today by winning the \$50,000 Empire City stake at Jamaica race track.

The Parker colt, who jumped into the limelight by capturing the Dwyer and Shelvin stakes while Warren Wright's Kentucky Derby and Preakness winner, Pensive, was on the downgrade, ruled a 2 to 1 favorite in the overnight odds.

PASS BY WINS RACE

SEATTLE, July 8 (AP)—Pass By, owned and trained by A. Shoemaker, made its name a description rather than a request in winning the feature race for 3-year-olds at Long acres last night. The winner paid \$5.40, \$2.90 and \$2.30.

Woman Seeks Track Record

HARRISBURG, Pa., July 8 (AP) Stella Walsh, Polish-American track star from Cleveland, sought a new record in the 200 meter event at the annual Women's National Track and Field championships today.

"I am confident I will set a world's record," said Miss Walsh after her final tune-up late yesterday. "This is the first time in national competition that the event has been run on a straightway."

The present record of 23.6 seconds was set by Miss Walsh at Cleveland in 1935. She also holds the national titles in the 200 meters, broad jump and 100 meter dash.

PORTLAND, July 8 (AP)—Production of western pine lumber rose by nearly three million board feet last week, the Western Pine association reported today.

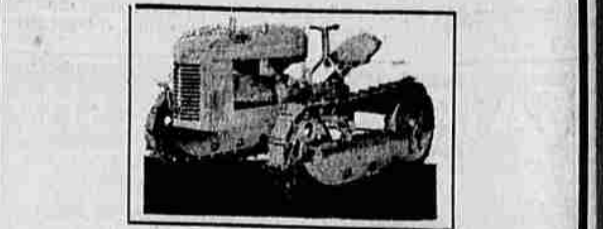
