

Many Women In Red Cross Work

In the master files at the Red Cross workrooms on Main street, the names of all those who have done surgical dressings are kept along with the number of hours they have worked on this special project. Heads of the surgical dressings project have asked that credit be given to the women of the county for the hours they have put in. Today we are presenting the names of those who work at the main workrooms, and next week those who have worked in the Shasta, Altamont, Mills, Merrill, Malin, Tulelake and Newell units, will appear. Hours given are from January 1, 1944, to July 1, 1944.

Many of these women do their Red Cross work besides making surgical dressings. Some sew, some knit, others are involved in the Nurses Aide program, a group of women work in the cutting department and still others have found places in the one-hundred-and-one jobs that are to be done in wartime. Two Presented in Concert Saturday

Californians, especially those of San Francisco and vicinity, are inclined to believe they have a corner on culture, but one Berkeleyan received a thrilling awakening last Saturday evening, July 1, at the First Presbyterian church in Klamath Falls when two young artists, Patricia Brown, voice student of Mrs. A. J. Vove, and Madelon Adler, pianist pupil of Mrs. E. D. Johnson, delighted a capacity audience.

Miss Brown is a mezzo-soprano whose lower tones are of contralto richness. While her upper register has not yet attained the maturity and depth of the lower, her voice shows promise of becoming a dramatic mezzo wide range.

The entire program of the young singer, who is only 16, showed a sympathetic interpretation far beyond her years.

At its present stage of development, the flexibility and warm timbre of Miss Brown's voice seemed most evident in such of her program songs as Gounod's "Au Printemps," de Koven's "A Winter Lullabye" and "The Lord Has Given Me a Song" by Wise-Livingston.

Madelon Adler, 13-year-old pianist, is practically in the prodigy class. Her clean-cut technique and easy use of shoulder muscles for power are amazing in her so young.

Her pedaling is excellent, as she skillfully demonstrated in Rachmaninoff's "Prelude in C Sharp Minor."

The accompanist is often the forgotten person at a concert, but perhaps this is a tribute to the smoothness and adaptability of a real artist. Certainly Marie Obenchain, as accompanist for Patricia Brown, provided that sureness of support and depth of musicianship without which no singer can give a good performance.

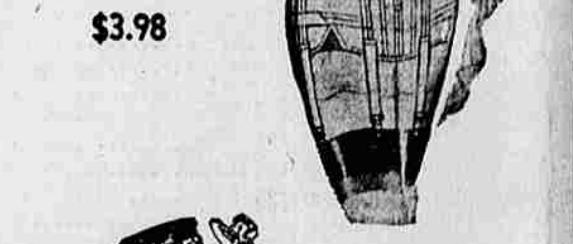
