Durocher in Danger as Dodgers Lose Number 13

Bums Match Longest Lose Streak of Season as Pirates Win; Browns Split

Manager Leo Durocher of the Brooklyn Dodgers seems to be on the spot again. His position, shaky the past few years, has been made more precarious than ever by the current losing streak of the Dodgers, which reached 13 officially yesterday.

Few managers have survived for long such a losing streak, especially in Flatbush where they take their baseball seriously. A nine-game losing streak, which was prolonged to 13, put the skids under Jimmy Wilson of the Chicago Cubs at the start of the season.

Brooklyn's 13th successive loss, which matched the season's low set by the Cubs, was handed to them by the Pittsburgh Pirates, 10-1 in the opener of a double header, the most of a double header losing streak in the history of the club.

McCarthy Announces Probable Lineup for All-Star Contest

By JACK HAND PITTSBURGH, July 10 (AP)—Joe McCarthy, manager of the American leaguers in the 12th annual all-star game tomorrow night at Forbes field, today announced his probable starting lineup, except for his pitcher and catcher whom he will make known tomorrow.

If the National league starting pitcher is a right-hander, McCarthy said, the Americans will be: Thurman Tucker, White Sox, cf; Stan Spence, Senators, rf; George McQuinn, Browns, 1b; Vernon Stephens, Browns, ss; Bob Johnson, Red Sox, lf; Ken Keltner, Indians, 3b; Bobby Doerfer, Red Sox, 2b.

McCarthy's list contained the name of no catcher but indications were this would be Rollie Hemsey of the Yankees. If the National league pitcher is a southpaw, McCarthy said his lineup will be the same except that Pete Fox of the Red Sox will be in right field instead of Spence, and Rudy York of the Tigers will replace McQuinn at first base.

Manager McCarthy remained close-mouthed about his pitcher but he was expected to choose between Hank Borowy of the New York Yankees and Tex Hughson of the Boston Red Sox. While no definite announcement has come from skipper Billy Southworth of the National leaguers, baseball men figured he would lead with his ace right-hander, Bucky Walters of the Cincinnati Reds.

With Lefty Max Lanier of the Cards out of action for 10 days due to an arm injury, Southworth is expected to follow Walters with Rip Sewell of the host Pittsburgh club and Nate Andrews of the Braves in an attempt to smash the junior circuit's 6-year win streak.

Bob Muncie of the Browns and Hal Newhouse of the Tigers are available for late duty with McCarthy's clan and Bobo Newsom of the A's may get a chance to strut his stuff before a sell-out crowd that will approach 40,000 and dump \$100,000 into the bat and ball fund for servicemen.

Three American league hurlers, Paul "Dixie" Trout of the Tigers, Dutch Leonard of the Senators and Orval Grove of the White Sox, and two National league chucks, Jim Tobin and Al Javery of the Braves, were practically eliminated from consideration by working Sunday games.

Southworth can use Phil Cavaretta of the Cubs at first base when McCarthy is using a right-hander or Frank McCormick of the Reds if a southpaw is on the hill. Connie Ryan of the Braves is the likely second baseman with Martin Marion of the Cards and Eddie Miller of the Reds sharing shortstop.

Bob Elliott's recent surge may get the Pirate third sacker the call but Whitey Kurowski of the Cards is a better bet for the hot corner. Walker Cooper of the Cards and Mickey Owen of the Dodgers are due for catching duty while the outfield probably will include Stan Musial of the Cards, Mel Ott of the Giants and either Dixie Walker of the Dodgers or Bill Nicholson of the Cubs.

All-Time PGA Team Record Set by Twin Cities Pair

MINNEAPOLIS, July 10 (AP)—An all-time best ball PGA team record of 31-28-59 was set today by the Twin Cities pair of Len Holstad and Joe Coria as they defeated the Chick-Harbert-Mike Turnesa combine seven up in the fourth round of the Golden Valley tournament.

The phenomenal 59, strung together with 12 birdies and one eagle, represented fourteen strokes under the 37-36-73 Golden Valley par, and discarded the previous all-time, non-breaking record of 61 established by Jug McSpaden and Byron Nelson in the tournament's first round.

Coria, 130-pound St. Paul pro, accounted for the team's eagle on the first hole by sinking a 30-foot putt for a three. With the exception of that feat the honors were well divided, both partners scoring six birdies apiece.

The Nelson-McSpaden combine finished the 126-hole, match play marathon with a plus 13 count in the scoring system—a three in point edge over the second place team of Bill Kaiser-Hamilton.

The Twin Cities twosome of Len Holstad and Joe Coria finished a surprising third, followed in order by Jimmy Hines-Willie Gordin, Sam Byrd-Johnny Revolta, Pvt. Chick Harbert-Mike Turnesa, Harry Cooper, Ellsworth Vines and Lieut. Ben Hogan-Tony Penna.

Nelson-McSpaden had a best ball aggregate for the seven rounds of 447 strokes—64 under par—for an average of 63.8 on each 18 hole try. Kaiser-Hamilton averaged 65.7.
