# DOUGLAS MAY BE WALLACE'S CHIEF RIVAL

WASHINGTON, July 13 (AP)—Supporters of Henry A. Wallace named Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas today as the vice president's chief rival for second place on the 1944 democratic ticket. . . . They also are keeping an eye on Senate Majority Leader Barkley, Speaker Sam Rayburn, Senator Truman (D-Mo.) and War Mobilization Director James F. Byrnes. . . . Organized campaigns are not yet in evidence for any of them. . . . None is likely pending an expected word from President Roosevelt that he wouldn't mind having Wallace for a running mate again but that somebody else might do. . . . The Wallace camp has an idea that a definite, if not open, drive is in progress for Douglas and that efforts will be made to recruit strength from followers of Barkley, Truman and others. . . . It has heard rumors that back of Douglas are Secretary of the Interior Ickes, Joseph P. Kennedy, former ambassador to England, and Thomas Corcoran, former Roosevelt "brain trust." . . . Private checks show, however, that the vice president probably will receive his heaviest support for renomination in the west and northwest, where Douglas, a Washingtonian, would be expected to have his greatest strength. . . . Senator Chavez (D-N.M.) announced yesterday he favors Wallace's renomination, declaring: "If the president is entitled to renomination, then common, ordinary American decency and fair play should demand that Vice President Wallace be renominated. This would be only his second term."

## Former Musical Comedy Star Dies

NEW YORK, July 13 (AP)—Mrs. Betty Compton Knappen, 37, wife of Theodore T. Knappen, an engineer, and previously the wife of former Mayor James J. Walker of New York, died last night. . . . Knappen said the one-time musical comedy star had been ill since the birth of a son last January 19. . . . Born Violet Halling Compton on the Isle of Wight, she went on the stage at an early age. . . . She had appeared here in the musical comedies "Oh Kay," "Hud Everything," "Funny Face," and "Fifty Million Frenchmen." . . . She was married to Walker in 1933 at Cannes, France, and was divorced from him in 1941. . . . A year later she was married to Knappen, her fourth husband.

And they do not intend to do so, they said, after they were married by Judge Feidler.

## FRENCH NEWSPAPERS OKEH FOR ACTION

ALGIERS, July 13 (AP) — French newspapers editorially approved President Roosevelt's announcement of July 11 accepting the French national committee as the working authority for civil administration of metropolitan France. . . . The newspapers printed also the president's remarks on the committee's power to issue currency, but omitted Mr. Roosevelt's definition of Gen. Eisenhower's authority as well as the president's reference that the United States was not recognizing the committee as the provisional government of France. . . . (Mr. Roosevelt explained that Gen. Eisenhower, as supreme commander, will have clear authority to take all steps necessary in his judgment for military operations and driving the Germans from French soil. He said it would be up to Gen. Eisenhower to declare which zones are ready for civilian administration and which must remain under military control.)

MOSCOW, July 13 (AP)—Eddy Gilmore of The Associated Press was elected president today of the Anglo-American Correspondents association.
