The Californian is a member of a veteran B-24 group, one of the first U. S. heavy bombardment units.

One of these base postoffices handles just about as much mail as a postoffice in Portland, Oregon, or Oakland, Calif., or Memphis, Tenn. This postoffice is different from the ones in the states in that the mail does not come in steadily day by day but as many as 60,000 sacks of mail arrive at one time.

This base postoffice also supplies postal items such as V-mail sorting cases, scales, twine, forms, stamps, etc., to army postoffices in the entire Medi-

terranean theater and also maintains a directory service.
