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## TULELAKE DRIVE TOPS BOND QUOTA

TULELAKE — Final returns on the Fifth War Loan drive in the Tulelake district of Siskiyou county, sponsored by the Tulelake grange, put the community well over the \$275,000 quota with complete returns showing \$283,790, it was announced Thursday by H. T. Street, grange master. Of the total \$131,075 were in the E series.

Outside financial interests, the state of California, Siskiyou county, the Southern Pacific, California-Oregon Power company, Standard Oil and Montgomery Ward and Company contributed generously in the buying of large blocks of bonds. A \$3000 bond was allocated to the Tulelake drive also by the Tidewater Associated Oil company, according to the recent owner, Henry Krupka, who was advised of the plan by letter.

The local drive was conducted by the zone system with chairman and four workers for all of the 11 zones and individuals in the community who were not contacted personally by some member of the organization during the drive were few.

## War Fund Drive Head Appointed

WASHINGTON, July 14 (AP) — President Roosevelt has approved appointment of Maj. Gen. Philip B. Fleming, federal works administrator, as government representative for this year's national war fund drive, the White House announced today.

Mr. Roosevelt said he was confident "that government workers throughout the nation will over-subscribe their goals, when they consider the valiant sacrifice which is being made by their own relatives and friends in our fighting forces."

The drive assembles contributions for the welfare and comfort of the nation's armed forces, assistance to the allies and local welfare and community chest purposes.

## APPLICATIONS OPEN FOR MP OFFICERS

FORT LEWIS, July 14 (AP) — Maj. Gen. Frederick Gilbreath, Fort Lewis army service commanding general, announced today that officer candidate applications for the corps of military police and chemical warfare service are again being processed.

He also announced that civil affairs officers will be selected and trained for duty in the Far East. "The selection contemplates the recruitment for a number of officers with special skills, including public safety," the announcement said.

Training provides for six weeks of instruction at the school of military government, Charlottesville, Va., and thereafter six months of instruction at a civilian university.

Far Eastern residence and travel are desirable in the qualification list. Applicants must be in grades from lieutenant to major, inclusive; 30 to 50 years of age; physically fit for overseas duty. Knowledge of an Asiatic language is desirable.

## Farmers Asked to Join in Farm Safety Week Program

Farm security borrowers in Klamath and Lake counties are being asked to join with farm organizations in observing July 23-29 as National Farm Safety week to cut down the heavy manpower toll of farm deaths and injuries resulting from accidents, reports Earl A. Gardner, county FSA supervisor, located in the court house, Klamath Falls.

Twenty thousand farm people were killed in farm accidents in 1943, and over 2,000,000 farmers, members of their families or hired help injured, according to figures of the National Safety Council, said Gardner. Farm manpower lost through these accidents, most of them preventable, would have produced a four and one-half days' supply of food for every person in the country, the report continued.

Every farmer knows of recent serious accidents in this section that have not only cut farm manpower but have caused human suffering. Most of these could have been prevented through more care in handling of machinery, equipment and livestock. Most farm fires result from some form of carelessness, and could have been prevented. Nearly half of the deaths of farm people occurred in the farm home through falls, firearms, burns and poisoning.

In observance of Farm Safety week, FSA borrowers can help prevent accidents through checking up on hazards that exist on their farms and taking corrective steps as soon as possible. Safety bulletins and check sheets are available through the county agent's office and a limited number can be secured by FSA borrowers at the county FSA office.
