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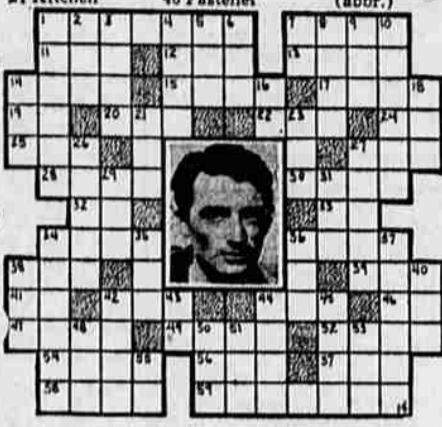

DEPARTMENT STOPS REQUEST SENDING

WASHINGTON, July 14 (AP)—The war department has decided to discontinue transmitting to theater commanders requests for soldiers overseas to be returned to this country because of illness in the family or other emergency reason.

This action is necessary, the department announced today, because of the strain imposed on communication facilities by military messages.

Henceforth, those making such a request will be asked to give it to the American Red Cross which, after an investigation, will make a recommendation through its own channels if it believes return of the soldier is necessary.

At the same time, the army also announced discontinuance of the practice of sending overseas requests for information on the condition of specific individuals.

The army said its policy is to report serious illness and subsequent changes to the next of kin as a matter of routine procedure, and in the absence of any such report it could be assumed that the individual's condition had not changed materially.

Night Club Hours Extended

PORTLAND, July 14 (AP)—Closing hour of night clubs and restaurant and hotel bars with liquor licenses has been extended by the state liquor commission from midnight to 2:30 a. m.

The commission also voted to extend the closing hour for beer licenses to 1 a. m. The ruling will have no effect on service personnel, who must still abide by army regulations regarding their frequent drinking establishments.

The midnight closing hour was put into effect at the request of the army shortly after Pearl Harbor.

In an effort to cut down illegal liquor sales, the commission extended closing time of at least two Portland liquor stores from 8 p. m. to 10 p. m.

CAA Men Inspect Redmond Air Base

REDMOND, Ore., July 14 (AP)—Civil aeronautics administration and airline officials inspected the Redmond airbase yesterday in connection with a proposed United Airlines route through Central Oregon from Portland to San Francisco.

The route would give a much needed transportation service and would furnish postwar employment, said Harvey Hancock, assistant to the president of the airline.

The plane carrying the group was the first mainliner to land on the big Redmond field. A hearing on the proposed route will be held before the civil aeronautics board in Washington, D. C., October 16.

Plastics to Grow In Importance

SEATTLE, July 14 (AP)—The three Ps—prefabrication, plastics and plywood—will be just as important to America's peacetime life as they are in the war effort, W. E. Dittford, managing director of the Douglas Fir Plywood association of Tacoma, predicted yesterday at a plywood-plastics conference here.

The natural resources of the Pacific northwest, plus its cheap power supply, will serve to make this area one of the centers of this industry, he stated.
