NEW YORK, July 18 (AP)—Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals held first place by a three-point margin in the National League batting race today, but Pete Fox squeezed past teammate Bobby Doerr of the Boston Red Sox to take over the lead in the American loop after 13 weeks of action.

Dixie Walker of Brooklyn closed in on Musial who lost 12 points during the week but the Cardinals outfielder had the edge of total hits, 108 to 107, with each at bat 305 times. Phil Weintraub of the New York Giants trailed the leaders in third place with 330. Figures included games of July 16.

Ortiz Loses To Willie Pep

BOSTON, July 18 (AP)—Four years ago, as an unknown, Willie Pep, the Hartford, Conn., boxing master, received \$1 a round for sparring with Manuel Ortiz, but today the former, who went on to win all but one of 76 bouts, figured he earned almost \$1000 for every three minutes spent in actual combat against that undisputed bantamweight champion.

Those titlists, for Pep is recognized in New York as the featherweight ruler, staged a catch-weights clash before 9759 at Braves field last night and the Hartford Italian, thanks to his accurate left jabbing and fleet footwork, made his onetime employer look like a tyro.

Parks put on a crowd-pleasing exhibition of skillful wrestling a couple of weeks back when he lost two out of three falls to Paavo Katonen, who is wrestling in the main event this week. Morelli is listed as a tricky grappler with a mean streak a mile long.

The opener this week is being fought between Bulldog Jackson and a newcomer, Tex Hauger. Hauger hasn't wrestled in Klamath for about five years, but he has been traveling all over the country in the meantime.

Richards put together rounds of 73 and 72 to finish a stroke ahead of Christian and Congdon who were tied for second. Charlie Jefferson of Bremerton was last among the 12 pros with an 86-78-164.

Congdon was elected president of the sectional PGA for the seventh successive year. Other officers are Roy Moe, Spokane, vice president; Bob Connolly, Seattle, secretary-treasurer; Richards, 3-year trustee; Ted Longworth, Portland, 2-year trustee. Ray Hall of Tacoma completes the board of trustees.

Detroit Gift to St. Louis; Curse On Yankees; Nobody Bothers National Leaders

The Tigers rest in a fifth place tie and have made only occasional spurts toward the head of the class but they have been "cousins" to the Browns while casting the evil eye on the McCarthy clan.

A Luke Sewell's men and New Yorkers, the 1-2 clubs of the junior loop, open an important 4-game series tonight in St. Louis, after an open date in both big leagues, the Browns 2-game edge can be credited to the Tigers and their pitching team of Hal Newhouser and Dizz Trout.

Chicago also has been rough on the Yanks but easy for St. Louis and a positive pushover for the Boston Red Sox who go into tonight's game with a record of 10 straight victories over the pale hose.

Of the four current members of the first division, the Yanks are the only team to play better than 500 ball against top row opposition.

In the National, the Cardinals have the drop on every other club including a 11-0 bulge on the Chicago Cubs although Charley Grimm's charges have bounced out of the cellar and are only four games out of the first division.

With an 11½-game edge on both Pittsburgh and Cincinnati, the Red Birds have little to fear despite the loss of George Mungler and the impending departure of Stan Musial. Billy Southworth has uncovered another starter in "Blix" Donnelly who went the route to beat Cincinnati first time out.

Night ball shows the opposition off the stand tonight when five of the six scheduled contests will be played under the arcs and the other will be a twilight affair in unlighted Briggs stadium at Detroit.

Northwest Faces Many Postwar Problems, Says WPB Vice Chairman

PORTLAND, Ore., July 18 (AP)—The northwest's war-boomed population faces greater postwar problems than any other section of the nation, Maury Maverick, war production board vice chairman, said here today.

He outlined a 10-point program for the area, in an address to the chamber of commerce. It was: 1—"You can't live off dams altogether, nor off free enterprise altogether; you need both." 2—"Multiple rental system for small businesses." 3—"Prosecution of anti-trust and anti-monopoly laws to eliminate unfair business practices." 4—"Immediate steps to get small manufacturers into production." 5—"Prompt settlement in contract terminations to prevent widespread bankruptcy and slowing up of reconstruction." 6—"Financial service for small business on the FHA plan." 7—"Distribution and breaking down of small properties." 8—"Encouragement of small business through a system of incentive taxation." 9—"Technical assistance at the disposal of small business." 10—"Participation in and understanding of foreign affairs by the American people."

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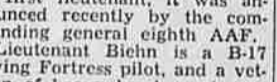
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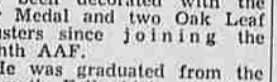
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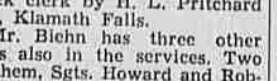
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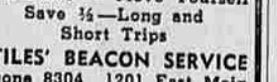
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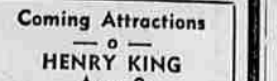
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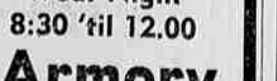
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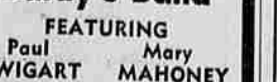
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WAVES MAY GO OVERSEAS BILL PASSED Overseas service for WAVES is assured if the present proposal for permitting their members of the women's reserve navy is passed by Congress according to Recruiting Specialist Dan Schreiber of the Klamath Falls navy recruiting station which handles WAVES applications in this area. Observing Washington, D. C., predicts congressional approval will be given.

The three main hurdles previously preventing assignment of WAVES to overseas duty have been overcome, the proposal approved by the House naval affairs committee, the House military committee, and the Senate military committee, was passed when the solons adjourned the summer. They will not be in areas where conditions are dangerous or critical.
