JOHNSTON WARNS AGAINST LET

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—Eric Johnston, president of the chamber of commerce of the United States, warns against letting the pace set by the agriculture and labor meet the challenge of our enemies.

Declaring that for the first time in five years "hope creeps in" Johnston said that such a slackening could delay the victory.

His statement was issued yesterday along with an 11-point program outlined by the chamber to make fully effective the economic forces of American industry toward shortening the war and preparing for peacetime production.

The chamber said business should devote its energies toward winning the war quickly and embracing policies under which service men and women can enter civilian life with ample employment.

578 CASES HANDLED IN OREGON COURT

WASHINGTON, July 18 (AP)—The census bureau in a report of reports from clerks of courts in Oregon for 1943 that during the year 578 cases of persons charged with criminal offenses were disposed of.

Of the total, 503 were convicted and sentenced and 75 that number were sent to state or the reformatory. Of 43 defendants charged with robbery, burglary, larceny, auto embezzlement and similar crimes, 393 were convicted and 90 persons charged with manslaughter, aggravated assault and rape, 66 were convicted.

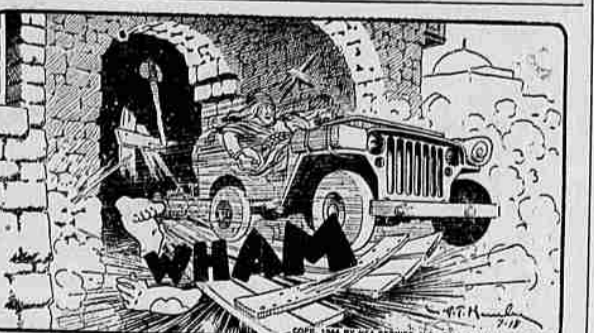

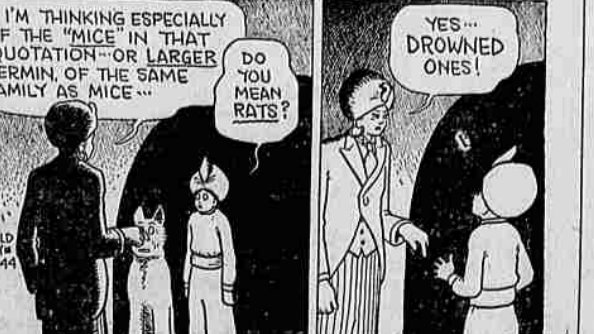

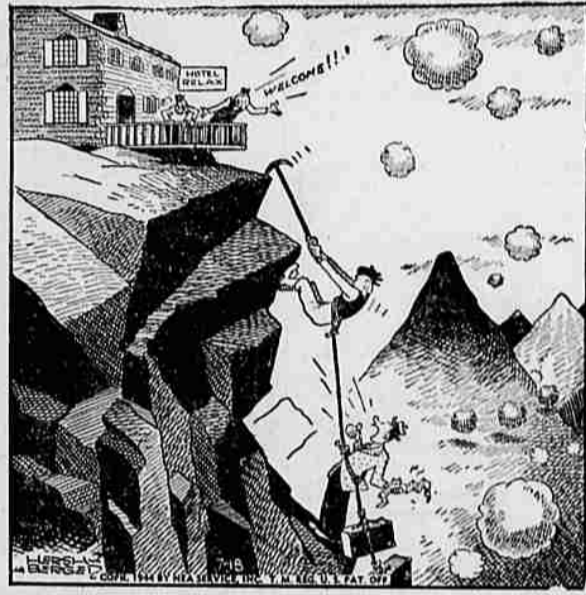
