TROOPS DRIVE FIVE MILES TOWARD PARIS

Orne in the first days of the invasion by the British sixth air-borne division.  
Push Southwest  
In twin thrusts from this area, one prong of attack pushed southwest along the east bank of the Orne into Caen's southern suburb of Vaucelles, and another hit south of Demouville—between Caen and Troarn to the east—to protect the flank. Both made excellent progress, and with its flank secure, the armored column advancing along the Orne turned south and hammered straight into the plain beyond.

In air operations today, the eighth U. S. air force announced the destruction of 53 German planes, 17 aloft and 36 aground.  
Gen. Sir Bernard L. Montgomery told a press conference that the allies had captured 80,000 Germans and buried 8000 in Normandy and added:  
"It's a reasonable conjecture that we have written off 156,000 Germans."

On the western portion of the Normandy front American units mopped up and occupied strategic St. Lo, cutting off a force of Germans in a salient two and one-half miles deep north of the town. The Yanks also cut the Haute and Vire rivers south of the village of Amigny, which is in American hands.

Pull Back

A front dispatch said the Germans had pulled back one to two miles along most sectors of the 48-mile American front. After withdrawing to ridges south of St. Lo, the nazis periodically shelled the town's rubble streets.  
Field reports told of long lines of tanks, armored cars and trucks, bumper to bumper for miles, moving up behind British-Canadian spearheads in the Caen area. Many German positions were overrun or by-passed; getting streams of prisoners and German wounded flowed toward the rear.

one of Italy's best harbors. It is the nearest port to the Yugoslav coast across the Adriatic.  
Prisoners Taken  
More than 2000 prisoners and large quantities of war material were taken by the Polish troops, who today were pursuing the retreating enemy relentlessly northward.  
The fall of Ancona came after a 75-mile advance against stubborn resistance offered by two German divisions which finally were forced to retire when the Poles smashed through their lines west of the city.  
Yanks Drive Wedge  
Further inland, as the result of a swift advance, American troops drove a wedge between German forces south of the Arno by capturing the town of Pontedera and cutting the direct east-west road between Pisa and Florence.  
In the central sector of the front, British troops of the fifth army made new gains west of Arezzo, sweeping across the Arno river on a front of six miles. An allied communique said the British seized the town of Monteverchi, 15 miles west of Arezzo.

The essential question is whether the great powers are willing to give the peoples of Europe freedom to work out their own solutions, or whether they will try to prevent far-reaching changes for the sake of social and economic status quo.—Dr. Hans Simons, director New York school of social research.

plane and plans to deliver his acceptance speech from overseas by radio.  
It leaked first last night when a Colorado congressman predicted in a speech in his home state that "the President will be in England in the next few days, if he is not now there, and will make his acceptance speech from overseas." The story got on the wires by accident and was promptly and MANDATORILY killed, but this morning the Washington censorship approved it for publication.  
Later in the morning, Democratic headquarters in Chicago announced: "President Roosevelt is expected to address the Democratic convention by radio tomorrow (Thursday) night."  
The Chicago schedule calls for his nomination tomorrow afternoon.

THE battle for the No. 2 place in the convention highlight. It's a stop-Wallace (if possible) affair. There's a story out today that if he can't have Wallace, FDR's second choice are Senator Truman of Missouri and Supreme Court Justice Douglas.  
Wallace is on the ground and fighting tooth and nail.

BYRNES, mentioned previously as one of the leading contenders, takes himself out of the race today, writing to Senator Baybank, of South Carolina: "In deference to the wishes of the President, I am NOT a candidate."

THE color issue is the big platform fight, overshadowing in noise at least the foreign policy plank. It is complicated by the political fact that the leaders are trying to corral both colored and white votes.

French Destroy Fuel Supplies

PORTBOU, Spain, July 19 (AP) — French patriot organizations have turned their energies against the German's dwindling fuel supplies throughout France, destroying gasoline, oil and coal already stored or en route to dumps and sabotaging mines and production plants, border reports said today.  
"This is only the beginning," declared a former Vichy official who crossed this frontier safely after the nazis identified him as being in league with the patriots. "We plan to continue until the only motive power the Germans have is their own feet."

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RUSSIANS OPEN NEW OFFENSE IN BALTIC

more than 700 populated places in this new push.  
Seventh Offensive  
Seven great soviet offensives now have been launched since June 23.  
Stalin ordered 200 salvoes from 224 guns to mark the successes of this offensive, which drove forward even as Russian forces to the south in Old Poland were crashing the outer defenses of the great fortress city of Brest Litovsk on the Bug river.  
Cross Curzon Line  
Other red army troops were reported to have crossed the Curzon line 45 miles to the north.  
The fresh Russian offensive in Old Poland, disclosed only yesterday, already had carried to the 1939 German-Polish demarcation line from where Hitler launched his attack on the soviet union in 1941. Moscow announced that troops of the first Ukrainian army group has seized Skomorokhli, on the east bank of the River Bug five miles above Sokol. This section of the Bug was part of the 1939 boundary.

Sweep on Lwow

The Russian drive was declared to be sweeping upon Lwow, old Polish rail center of 317,700, like a tidal wave. Moscow at mid-night reported red army forces 22 miles northeast and 21 miles east of the city.

Court Upholds U. S. in Case

WASHINGTON, July 19 (AP) — The United States court of appeals today upheld government contentions in the Montgomery Ward case that directives of the war labor board are not subject to court review, reversing a decision of the district court.  
The government had asked the lower court to dismiss Montgomery Ward's suit against the WLB because in the decision today the employer's group of motor freight carriers against the WLB the court of appeals had held that WLB directives were not subject to judicial review.

ammunition and fuel are being spotted by bombers off Halmahera island, indicative of enemy concern over outpost defenses for the Philippines. MacArthur said today his air patrols left a 3000-ton freighter-transport afire and dead in the water in that vicinity Tuesday.  
Yesterday he reported the sinking within 10 minutes of another such bombed ship, jammed with enemy troops and supplies.  
On British New Guinea, 787 Nipponese have been killed recently in the unsuccessful attempt to break out of a MacArthur-set trap west of Wewak.  
The Germans' food situation cannot be termed critical yet, but the first signs of a situation comparable to 1917 are beginning to appear.—A British food expert.

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Platform Drafters Eye World Organization Plank

CHICAGO, July 19 (AP)—Mrs. J. Borden Harriman appealed to democratic platform drafters today for a declaration on international organization armed with police powers to enforce its decisions.

Asserting the American people will condemn those "who play political tag with the future of the world," the former minister to Norway declared that what the people want "is an endorsement of the good old American principle of collective security."  
A tense behind-the-scenes struggle over the racial issue bedeviled the platform committee as it drove public hearings toward a close with a forum on foreign policy.  
Mrs. Harriman, speaking for Americans united for world organization, said groups upholding her viewpoint, do not propose to leave their case "in the rarefied atmosphere of academic gentlemen" who "mumble into their beards" over intricate points.  
Ely Culbertson, the bridge expert, speaking for the "fight for total peace," organization, proposed:  
A permanent voluntary international organization based on renouncing wars of aggression, and which will preserve sovereign rights and provide fair representation of member states in a federative government, with power limited "to common collective defense against aggressors and supported by an international police force."  
As the hearings went on into the afternoon, committeemen gave every private indication that the final choice for a foreign plank already is settled on and that it has Secretary of State Hull's approval and presumably that of the president.  
This is a proposal of approximately 300 words prepared by Senator Tom Connally of Texas, chairman of the senate foreign relations committee, which reportedly calls for the use of force to prevent aggression and keep the peace.
