Pastor G. W. Wheatley to Move to Chicago August 1

Word has just been received in Klamath church circles that Pastor G. W. Wheatley of the Bible Baptist church will be leaving Klamath Falls for Chicago, Ill., about August 1, accompanied by Mrs. Wheatley.

The Wheatleys, after many years in Bible class and church activities in and around Klamath Falls, have accepted a call from the Christian Business Men's committee of Chicago to become directors of the Victory Service Center, located in downtown Chicago, at Fifth and Washington streets, for service men exclusively. This is one of the largest Christian Service centers in the United States, with a branch at Waukegan, Ill.

Pastor and Mrs. Wheatley came to Klamath Falls in 1937 and organized the Altamont Community Presbyterian church and later re-opened the Mt. Laki Community church.

In 1939 the Wheatleys resigned their pastorate and went to Salt Lake City where they conducted Bible study classes for one year and, returning to Klamath Falls in 1940, the Fundamental Bible center was opened at 2nd and Pine where Bible classes have been conducted to the present time. Mrs. Wheatley has continued to hold Bible classes in various parts of the city since that time.

In the spring of 1942 they answered the call by the congregation of the Bible Baptist church which was then a new building in construction, which had been organized by Dr. C. B. Casel in 1939. Under their effort the church has shown steady growth with a Bible training school of nearly 150. The building has been almost completed and entered the new year with all debts completely erased.

The Bible classes will continue at the Fundamental Bible center under the supervision of Rev. Joseph Bedoin, who will move his family to the Center about August 1. The congregation of the Bible Baptist church has extended a call to Rev. Keith Fields of Wasco, Ore., to be their new pastor.

Income Tax Information

This advertisement is addressed to those whose tax is not being withheld from their salaries or wages:

All other persons should be sure to file their declaration of anticipated income for this year 1944. The first such declaration was due April 15, this year, and most all the people have filed such declaration. However, some have not, who should have done so. If any who read this have not, they should now get busy and attend to the matter at once. Then there are some who were not engaged in business until after April, or even later. They were not liable, but if they have had an income since then on which they can base a declaration, these should be sure and make such declaration on or before Sept. 15, 1944, and pay their share of tax due on such income at that time. This would place them in good standing as a "pay-as-you-go" taxpayer. Not only those engaged in business in this class, but also farm labor, casual labor, domestic help, and all those having incomes, from which the tax is not being withheld, should file such declarations.

This is not a difficult thing to do, but will save you time and expense, if it is done. The Simplified Tax Law does make beneficial changes for all taxpayers, but there is nothing in the new law that relieves him from the requirement of seeing that his income taxes are fully paid up, on or before December 15th, 1944, as nearly as it is possible to estimate the same.
