Cecil Tops Coast Loop Pitchers

LOS ANGELES, July 20 (AP)—San Diego's Rex Cecil is leading Pacific coast pitchers for the sixth consecutive week after 17 victories and six defeats for a .739 mark.

The Padre right hander, today's averages show, has struck out 154 batters and his teammate, Fireball Frankie Dasso, the leader in that department much of the time, is now second with 132. Dasso has won 10 and lost 10.

Marino Pieretti, Portland southpaw, forged into second place with 15 wins and seven losses, one victory ahead of Clem Dreiswerd, Sacramento lefty, for whom a major league club is reported to have bid \$37,500. The veteran Tom Seats of San Francisco remains in fourth place with 24 wins and eight losses.

Roy Helsler, Portland, has won twelve and lost eight, with 81 strikeouts, and Carl Fischer took the Seattle pitchers with ten wins and seven losses.

MULTNOMAH COUNTY: Lakes and sloughs on Sauvie island unusually low.

COLUMBIA: Angling poor because of extreme low water.

TILLAMOOK: Fair. COOS: Fair, with streams low and water clear.

CURRY: Fishing improved last week, but salmon catches in the Rogue river still poor.

DESHUTES: Fair, with the best prospects in Fast lake, using dry flies.

JEFFERSON: Fair catches reported from Suttle and Blue lakes; a few limit catches reported on the Metolius.

KLAMATH: Upper Klamath lake good for trolling at Rocky Point and Harriman lodge; good catches reported from Agency lake, and at the mouths of Wood and Williamson rivers and Seven Mile creek.

LAKE: Chewaucan, Ana, and the south fork of the Sprague river yielding fair catches of rainbow trout.

NEW YORK, July 21 (AP)—It will cost \$75,000 for a front-row seat at the fourth fight between Beau Jack and Bob Montgomery in a little over a year.
