Demo Platform Uses Fourth Term, World Police Organization

By ERNEST B. VACCARO CHICAGO, July 21 (AP)—The democratic party wooed the 1944 electorate today with a platform calling for a fourth term based on President Roosevelt's record "in peace and in war" and a promise to seek military backing to prevent another blood bath of conflict.

The road ahead was paved with party dissension over the racial issue — sparkplug of a vain but bitter southern revolt unallayed by a pliant ignoring definite commitments sought by advocates and opponents of the "white supremacy" status quo.

"That God may keep him strong in body and spirit to carry on his yet unfinished work is our hope and prayer," it said.

In a 40-word "racial plank" stripped alike of states' rights proposals and demands for endorsement of anti-discrimination, anti-poll tax and anti-lynching legislation, the party declared:

"Right to Live" "We believe that racial and religious minorities have the right to live, develop and vote equally with all citizens and share the rights that are guaranteed by our constitution.

A motion by the Missouri delegation, apparently reflecting feeling among many southern democrats, failed to get the necessary one-fifth support for a poll of the convention on this plank.

FPHA Trailer Houses Open To Civilian War Workers

More than 50 FPHA trailer houses located at Union and Radcliffe on Washburn Way, were opened this week for occupancy and are available to civilian war workers and their families.

C. A. Hayden, well known Klamath resident, is manager of the trailer house community. Ace L. Irvine, housing management adviser out of the regional FPHA office arrived in Klamath Falls this week to get occupancy for trailers under way.

The new housing units are fully equipped and wired for electricity. Two large trailers provide shower and sanitary facilities and there is another large unit for laundry purposes. The trailer houses rent for \$6 a week, this amount including electricity and garbage collection.

Eligible to live in the trailer houses are workers and their families from the following companies:

Whitehouse, Price and Perrin construction employes are eligible only if the prospect is that they will be stationed in the locality for the duration of the war.
