

ANNING FOR POSTWAR TO BEGIN SOON

SALEM, July 25 (AP)—All communities and private industry are making their post-war plans immediately because of the probability of an early end of the war, the state post-war commission today in a report to Governor Snell.

The commission said that military authorities predict the surrender of Germany within five months, and that Japan will be defeated next year.

Oregon, the commission said, will be "immediately stripped" of its military installations. It said Camp White is being dismantled and is being used for prisoners of war.

The commission estimated that 10,000 Oregon men who will have entered the armed forces by the end of this year will receive \$162,489,580 in benefits from the federal GI bill of rights.

The hunger strike of Tulelake granges in the center stockade went into its seventh day today with no indications of any of the men weakening in his determination not to eat until released from the isolation area.

All of the strikers answered "No" to the question whether they would get out of bed when an armed security officer went through the stockade, asking each man if he wanted anything.

War relocation officials said that food left in the kitchen of the stockade was untouched. The strike began on July 19, it was not disclosed until yesterday when a spokesman for the strikers told the WRA about the intentions of the 14 men.

When the strike started, there were 16 men in the stockade, two of them were released a day or two later through normal procedure of processing the cases of stockade occupants, WRA said today.

Segregated held in the stockade are classified as troublemakers by WRA, and most of them have been there since the disorders at the center late last fall.

Sixth War Loan Dates Tentatively Set by Treasury

WASHINGTON, July 25 (AP)—The sixth war loan may begin November 11 and end December 7—anniversaries of World War I armistice and the attack on Pearl Harbor.

The treasury, saying the dates had been discussed with various state chairmen, emphasized that no decision has been reached. Nor has the goal of the next drive been decided.

The fifth war loan ended officially July 8, but final figures have not yet been announced. Sales, however, far exceeded the \$16,000,000,000 goal.

McGee Favors Plan For First Offenders

SALEM, July 25 (AP)—Richard A. McGee, superintendent of California correctional institutions, who conferred with the board of control yesterday on Governor Earl Snell's proposal to build a penal institution for first-term offenders, is heartily in favor of the plan, the governor said today.

McGee will file a written report, and will determine if the plan is economical. While the governor had suggested an institution for teenage first offenders, McGee suggested that it be used for all first-term offenders, regardless of age, who can be rehabilitated. Of the 800 state prison convicts, 386 are first offenders.

The governor said it would be a tough problem to find money for the proposed institution, as new buildings must be built at other institutions.

MILK SALE QUOTAS SAME AS FOR JULY

CHICAGO, July 25 (AP)—Quotas limiting August sales of fluid milk and milk by-products will be the same as July, but the cream quota will be cut 15 per cent, the war food administration said today.

Dealers will be permitted to sell 100 per cent as much fluid milk as in the base period of June, 1943; 90 per cent as much milk by-products and 75 per cent as much cream. The cream quota was 90 per cent during July, the WFA explained, and the reduction reflects a nationally tight butterfat supply.

In the southern states, cream and by-products quotas are combined and dealers are permitted to sell 85 per cent as much milk in the combined quota as they did in the base period.

McClelland Barclay Presumed Dead

NEW YORK, July 25 (AP)—Lt. Com. McClelland Barclay, 50, nationally known artist listed as missing in action a year ago, now is presumed to be dead, the navy advised his brother, Robert H. Barclay.

Barclay, whose paintings and sketches were to be part of a permanent historical record of the war, was a passenger of the USS LST-342 when it was torpedoed in the Solomons sea, July 18, 1943, the navy said.

He designed covers for The Saturday Evening Post, Ladies Home Journal and Pictorial Review and drew many recruiting posters in the last war.
