Now, the interesting thing is the lack of immediate response to the opening of the "step-gap" trailer houses. Fifty-five of these trailers were made available a few days ago to in-migrant essential workers...

Restrictions

IT IS also possible that the number of qualified families here is drastically reduced by the restrictions set up for occupancy of this war housing. That there is a shortage of housing is undoubted...

This war housing is now available to in-migrant essential workers—people who come here to work for lumber companies, the railroads, as registered nurses, or as civilian employees of the Marine Barracks or the air station...

Can't Move In

IT WILL be seen from these restrictions that there are many people here, seeking housing, who can't take advantage of the war housing being made available.

For instance, we know a military man who has his wife and family here with him. They are occupying two cabins in an auto court, paying considerably over \$100 a month.

Military men with families here cannot occupy the housing unless some member of the family gets an essential job.

Relaxation Possible

THIS, as we have said, adds up to the possibility that the housing construction with its accompanying occupancy restrictions is not the real solution to the problem here.

relax the restrictions. It has been done elsewhere. We don't like to mention it again, but it is painfully clear that all of this housing—the stop-gap trailers and the row-housing yet to be finished—comes tardily into a situation that has been short for many months.

WASHINGTON, July 25—It was an interesting crowd of democratic office holders who trooped back from Chicago. The look on their faces could raise a smile from anyone. Not that any seemed especially disgusted or elated.

What they did at Chicago in the last analysis was to form a purely practical political working arrangement for the campaign between the city bosses on the one hand and the left-leaders, even CIO on the other.

Personally Unpopular?

NOW they did not kick Mr. Wallace out because he is a radical. He had just become personally unpopular and they wanted to win. If the New Dealers had a more powerful candidate than Wallace, I do not believe Truman would have received the nomination.

Battle Yet to Be Won

WILL this arrangement win the election? I do not believe the average democratic leader here is confident. The battle is yet to be won. A city-CIO combination for instance is actually a small minority of the country.

This year with the war likely to break before election, with the peace unsettled, it is probable people may take the election more as a matter of course. Extremely light votes have appeared already in the primaries.
