PLANES AGAIN SUPPORT ARMY IN NORMANDY

LONDON, July 26 (AP)—U. S. marauders and fighter-bombers again supported the American first army today smashing at German positions wave on wave and blazing the trail for a new dawn thrust south of the Periers-St. Lo road.

The dawn attack in Normandy followed RAF assaults in great strength over Germany. Stuttgart, engineering and rail center, was saturated for the second successive night. The British also struck Berlin. Bremen, Mannheim and Wanne-Eickel, despite severe electrical storms.

By mid-afternoon, the medium bombers had conducted a virtual shuttle service over the Normandy battle grounds. They attacked Nazi troops, tanks and field artillery positions. German fighters did not appear and all American planes returned to bases safely.

Approximately 1000 four-motored British bombers and a large number of lesser craft participated in the overnight assaults, which were carried out at a total cost of 13 planes.

Stuttgart, engineering and transport city in southwestern Germany which had been hit the preceding night by more than 30,000 incendiaries and a great weight of high explosives, was the principal target of the heavy bombers, but flying bomb installations in northern France also were given a strong going-over.

Strong forces of Halifaxes smashed at a synthetic oil plant at Wanne-Eickel in the Ruhr. Mosquitos attacked Berlin for the third night with many two-ton block-busters.

CONSTRUCTION OF LUMBER MILL SET

A \$500,000 lumber mill is to be constructed immediately at Anderson, near Redding, Calif., by the Deschutes Lumber company, former operator of a plant at Mowich, Klamath county.

R. G. Watts, manager of the company, announced the plans. The federal road project administration has approved a \$200,000 logging road to run from Anderson to Oak Run to make timber accessible. Men and road equipment supplied by Shasta county will build part of the road.

First work will be on a power house and shipping facilities. The Deschutes Lumber company has a close relationship with the Lamm Lumber company of Klamath county.

Mother Robin Kills Baby With Kindness

PORTLAND, July 26 (AP)—A mother robin choked one of her babies to death, says Emanuel Erikson. But she was only trying to make it grow in a hurry, he hastens to add.

Instead of the usual angle-worm, she tried to poke a seven-inch snake down its throat, Erikson says. He brought the dead bird, with the snake's head stuck in its throat, into a Portland newspaper office as proof.

Campbell Conducts Lumber Conference

Don Campbell, head of the lumber division of the war production board, was in Klamath Falls last week to conduct a conference among lumbermen of this community in order to answer their questions on new regulations of the WPB.

Lumbermen from all over the Klamath basin and Lakeview, as well as from other mills near here, attended the conference. Campbell explained the new regulations and the lumber freeze which is to go into effect on August 1.

He had previously conducted a similar conference in Portland.
