

PLANES SCORE VICTORIES IN AIR BATTLES

ROME, July 27 (AP)—Air battles, such as cost the German air force a record loss of 193 planes in the past three days, raged in the Mediterranean heavy bombers again today when medium forces attacked the Manfred Weiss Steel Works in Budapest, Hungary.

First reports from up to 500 bombers participating said the bomber gunners, as well as Lightning and Mustang pilots scored a number of victories to boost the total of 193 tallied in the last three days, a top mark for this theater. One of the hardest knocks yet received by the Germans in this area was delivered yesterday when allied aircraft knocked down 78 enemy planes.

The Manfred Weiss Works is one of the largest industrial plants in Hungary and produces aircraft engines, guns, ammunition, machine tools and other war essentials.

Liberator and Fortress crews said this target was well hit and enveloped by smoke.

LT. SEMON REPORTED DROWNED IN FRANCE

Lt. Charles Semon, who was reported killed in action on D-Day, met death by drowning, evidently after a parachute jump over France.

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Semon, parents of Charles, were informed that their son drowned by Colonel R. F. Sink, commanding officer of his parachute regiment.

Colonel Sink said in his letter that the body was recovered and was buried in a parachute in an American cemetery.

"The loss of this fine officer is deeply regretted by the regiment," said Colonel Sink. "I began to know Charles very well. He was respected and liked by the officers and men of his battalion."

The colonel's letter did not state in what body of water Lt. Semon dropped in his parachute, but it is presumed here it was some stream in France.

present course of conduct." Peluffo was embraced by Farrell after his speech.

Denies Pro-Nazi Charge

Peluffo said "we do not admit" that pro-Nazi elements are maintained in the government and he disputed the accusation that Argentina has been helping any cause but her own.

The state department declared that Farrell's regime has made "spasmodic token gestures" of cooperation but the department said "in almost all instances they have been designed to do no more than foster the false hope that Argentina might yet be prepared to honor her solemn pledge of hemisphere solidarity."

Based On War

The determination to isolate Argentina diplomatically is based entirely on war considerations, the department official said. "Deserting the allied cause" was the charge.

No hint was given as to whether this government is prepared to take economic measures against Argentina backing up its vigorous condemnation.

centric threat from the south, northeast and east.

The Germans said a great tank battle was developing on the level plains around the Vistula river bridgeheads—the same flat terrain that stretches without break 140 miles to German Silesia. The area is 355 air miles from Berlin, closest allied approach to that capital.

Behind Lines

The city of 81,000 has been surrounded several days and is well behind the Russian advance lines. Moscow dispatches have said. It lies on a trunk rail line from Leningrad to the Polish capital and on a lateral railway from East Prussia to Brest Litovsk.

Bialystok was a main German fortress position protecting the approaches to East Prussia, 45 miles to the northwest. It is the thirteenth largest city of the country which was Poland between the wars. It was old Poland's largest textile center except for Lodz.

Nazis Resume Use Of Flying Bombs

LONDON, July 27 (AP)—After a 12-hour lull German flying bombs came hurtling over London and southern England again today, causing new damage and casualties, although the opening barrage was not on a heavy scale.

Several persons were killed and injured when a bomb landed in a residential district, wrecking a row of houses. In another area a group of empty houses previously damaged were completely destroyed.

Britons expressed wonder as to whether new terror weapons would be called into use by the Germans. "Paul Joseph Goebbels, the German war mobilizer, made veiled threats in his speech last night, but so far the V-1, packing 2240 pounds of explosive, is the only such weapon in action."
