Police Force Does Job Despite Man Shortage

Work for Klamath Falls city police has increased during the past year, but the 16 men active on the police force have been able to take care of their extra duties so far. Military installations coming into the Klamath Falls area have not affected the work of the city police department to a very great extent as military police, marine patrol, and shore patrol men have taken care of that part of the law enforcement. . . . The department is now short four men, but its 16 men now on the job are capable of holding up their end of the work. This number does not include the two merchant police who are paid by the merchants to patrol the city every night. . . . These men, along with the rest of the police force, are under the supervision of Police Chief Earl Heuvel. . . . Duties of the city police include desk sergeant jobs, police car work, and several men are kept on the streets most of the time. A 24-hour schedule is carried out and each of the men receives one day off a week in addition to a two week's vacation every year. It takes seven and one-half months for the entire force to have their vacation periods. . . . Nine men on the force are there under civil service examination and the others were made special officers. . . . In recent shooting tests taken by the men on the force, six of the officers received a rating of expert, and the others all re-

ceived the rating of marksman. Those who received the expert rating were James Brown, R. E. Switzer, Oscar Gerleve, R. N. Adkins, Roscoe Lilly, and Charles Howard. . . . Target practice is held every second Sunday for members of the police reserve. The members of this group are subject to call at any time by Chief Heuvel. . . . Besides the men employed by the police department, there is a police matron, Pauline McDonald, who also acts as a stenographer. . . . Men now on the police force are J. G. Linkenbach, Frank Blackmer, O. H. Hamilton, R. E. Switzer, R. N. Adkins, James Brown, L. M. Ackerman, Charles Howard, Dean Hall, Leslie Liebman, Verne Wagner, William E. Peck, Oscar Gerleve, Anthony Nelms, Verne Bloomberg and Gilbert Hosier. . . . The two merchant policemen are Roscoe Lilly and Dan Emrick.

Hyde to Enter Race For Demo Leader

Hyde of Eugene entered the picture as a candidate for chairman of the state democratic central committee today, after the receipt of a telegram here saying he would "be honored to serve" if chosen. . . .
