**APRICOT JAM RECIPE
SAVES SUGAR, FRUIT**

**Make It This Quick
Easy Way**

4 Cups Ground Fruit
4 Cups Sugar
1/4 Cup Lemon Juice
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash and pit 4 pounds fully ripe apricots, grind. Do not peel. Measure exactly 4 level cups of the ground fruit (add water to fill last cup, if necessary) into a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin and lemon juice, stir well and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), continue stirring, and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let the boil subside, stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh pres-

**Justice Prevents
Catastrophe On
Camping Trip**

BAKER, July 27 (AP)—Su-
preme Court Justice William O.
Douglas turned his legal mind to
a primitive problem and prevent-
ed a minor catastrophe while on
a camping trip deep in the Wal-
lowa mountains.

Blaine Hallock, Baker attorney
who was in the party, said
yesterday after returning that all
cooking and eating utensils were
misplaced, so Douglas improvised
a griddle out of an old prospector's
shovel blade, well scoured
with sand. A tomato can served
for a kettle.

No one suffered from lack of
food, Hallock added.

**ASSAULT TERRIFIES
NAZI PARATROOPS**

IN NORMANDY**, July 27 (AP)
A massive American air assault
flushed a covey of German para-
chutists yesterday and they
ran out sobbing and screaming.
"This is not war; it's criminal."
Terror glazed their eyes.

Their motley, camouflaged
jumpers flapped in the wind as
they ran. They were some dis-
tance behind the first American
troops before they could be
headed off.

Splendid physical specimens,
they quieted down under the
calm handling of Sgt. Ernest
Gunzburg of Miami, Fla., Ger-
man-born interpreter, and Corp.
John Bear, his assistant, from
Forest Hills, N. Y.

A 19-year-old Nazi who re-
ported he had been a medical
student at Munich, said he
thought our air bombardment
which he called a rug of
bombs—was "inhumane."
"How about Warsaw?" he
was asked.

"We were defending our-
selves."
"Rotterdam?"
"Rotterdam was a fortress."
"And London?"
"They started it."
It was the same with the rest,
who ranged from 19-year-olds
to men in their forties.

Men in one group said they
surrendered because they were
without water and had had only
one meal for days. They wolfed
canned "C" rations like hungry
animals.

**KLAMATH CAP
TO RECRUIT
AIR CADETS**

The Klamath Falls squadron
of the civilian air patrol has
been charged with responsibility
for recruitment and preliminary
training of all air force cadets in
Klamath county, it was an-
nounced today by Lt. Ray
Byrnes, public relations officer.
Meetings are held in room 105
in the west wing of the high

school building and all inter-
ested persons should attend the
session next Monday night. Boys
or girls from 15 to 18 are eli-
gible for CAP training.
From the CAP trainees air
force cadets will be chosen.
When the classes are started,
an army air force liaison plane
will be brought here for indo-
ctrination flights of those grad-
ed up.
Beginning with Monday night's
meeting, a class in meteorology
will be given by William B. Hay-
den, former war training service
instructor. This instruction will
be free of charge to anyone in-
terested in joining either the
cadet or senior group.
This is ground school train-
ing, Byrnes explained, and any-
one interested in flying now or
after the war will find the pro-
gram valuable.

**ARGENTINE PEOPLE
PRO-ALLY, REPORT**

PORTLAND, July 27 (AP)—A
vacationing missionary to the
Argentine said today that 75 per
cent of Argentina's populace is
pro-ally, and attributed the na-
tion's neutrality to basic eco-
nomic problems.
Rev. John A. Cochran, super-
intendent of missions for the
Church of the Nazarene in Ar-
gentina, said the Argentine peo-
ple—though not favoring the
Nazis—fear allied capitalists
would exploit their nation after
the war.
"All the railroads are owned by
the British," he said. "The tele-
phone systems are owned by

United States corporations, and
other national resources have
been grabbed by foreigners. The
Argentines want to exploit their
own natural wealth."
Argentina, he added, must look
to Europe for postwar export
trade, since its principal products
—meat and grain—compete with
United States' exports.

How to make a "Jiffy" cake

JIFFY CAKE
1½ cups enriched flour ¼ cup mmw
2½ tps. baking powder ½ cup softened
¼ tsp. salt 1 egg
1 cup sugar 1 egg
1 tsp. vanilla extract

Sift flour; measure; sift into large bowl with baking powder, salt, and sugar. Measure milk into cup; add shortening to fill. Dump milk, shortening, unbeaten egg, and flavoring into flour mixture. Beat with rotary beater 2 to 3 minutes, or until batter is smooth. Pour batter into well greased shallow square cake pan (8x8x2). Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) 30 minutes, or until done. Serve warm or cold, plain or with sauce. Serves 8.

CUP CAKES
1½ cups enriched flour 1 cup sugar
2½ tps. baking powder 1 tsp. vanilla extract
¼ tsp. salt 1 egg
½ cup shortening ½ cup milk

Sift flour; measure; mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt. Cream shortening until smooth; gradually add sugar, creaming until fluffy; beat in vanilla and egg. Add flour alternately with milk, beating until smooth after each addition. Turn into greased muffin pans and bake in moderate oven (375° F.) about 25 minutes. Makes 18 cakes.
