MASS ATTACK METHOD USED FOR ROBOTS

LONDON, July 29 (AP)—The nazis adopted a new "mass attack" technique in hurling flying bombs at London and southern England during the night, send-

ing the robots over in batches with brief lulls between each onslaught.

The attacks took a fresh toll of casualties, including patients in a hospital which was badly damaged.

Last night RAF Halifaxes, probably carrying six-ton "earthquake" bombs, attacked a supply depot in the Pas-de-Calais area near Watten, believed connected with the nazi threat to launch 10-ton rockets against England. The depot is near flying-bomb launching sites.

Workers spent most of the night digging for bodies at the spot where a flying bomb blew up a crowded restaurant at noon yesterday, killing and trapping a number of persons.

It was estimated, meanwhile, that 200,000 persons had left London for safer havens in the country—far more than the number evacuated in 1941.

Despite the toll taken by the flying bombs, a poll conducted by the Daily Express showed only a bare majority of those under attack in southern England favored reprisals. The poll found 54 per cent in favor, 42

per cent against and 4 per cent in doubt.

Lamb to Remain Rationed Despite Stockmen's Protes

PORTLAND, Ore., July 29 (AP)—Lamb will remain rationed despite protests of northwest livestock men and butchers that lamb cuts are spoiling for lack of buyers.

Charles R. Baird, San Francisco, western regional administrator for the office of price administration, said Washington, D. C. headquarters turned down his recommendation of a 30-day rationing holiday in Oregon and Washington.

Senator Gordon (R-Ore.) also had urged the OPA to remove points from lamb to alleviate what he described as a market glut for that type of meat. He said the agency advised his secretary in Washington it would confer with the war food administration to try to find a solution of the problem.

RESTRICTION OF INFORMATION MADE

WASHINGTON, July 29 (AP)—In an outgrowth of the Argentine affair, agriculture department employees have been instructed to provide no information or comment to the press, the trade or to "other non-governmental officials" or negotiations of this country with foreign governments, except when specifically authorized.

This instruction was given in a departmental memorandum signed by Secretary Wickard and War Food Administrator Marvin Jones.

The memorandum said that "injurious comments" attributed to an agriculture department official with regard to recent negotiations for the importing of Argentine corn to help meet a grain shortage in this country had had embarrassing repercussions in the South American country.

The instruction, if rigidly adhered to, would affect sources of information on a broad field of farm department and war food administration activities.

OPA to Cancel Outstanding Tire Certificates

WASHINGTON, July 29 (AP)—The office of price administration has decided to cancel nearly all outstanding ration certificates for heavy bus and truck tires, effective at midnight, tonight, so that needs of operators may be re-examined in the light of sharply reduced allocations and new priority ratings.

The agency is making the drastic move, it was learned today, because certificates for about 100,000 heavy-duty tires are in circulation, while only 60,000 casings will be available in August.

It was understood the cancellation order will apply to all but the relatively few certificates issued in the last few days.

10,000 Tons of Aluminum to Arrive

CASTLE ROCK, July 29 (AP)—The Salem, Ore., experimental processing plant will receive 10,000 tons of aluminum clay from the Camp Cowlitz deposit within the next three months for initial tests, Kenneth White, engineer for Columbia metals corporation, reported.
