DEWEY PROMISES TO BUILD 'BEST PEACE'

By JACK BELL SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Aug. 1 (AP) In his first train platform speech of the campaign, Governor Thomas E. Dewey told a Springfield crowd today that if he is elected "in the next four years we shall build the best peace the world has ever seen." Greeted by an enthusiastic crowd which massed about the rear end of his train, Dewey asserted that America will win the war because "our strength depends upon the American people and upon no one man." The crowd cheered when Dewey promised, if elected, to "restore the government to the people of the United States."

Kansas City Ready For Celebration

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 1 (AP)—Kansas City's merchants won't be unprepared for the pandemonium on V-Day—the day Germany gives up the fight. The Merchants association has decreed that all downtown stores must close within minutes after the first word is received, the employees are to put cash, records and valuable merchandise in protected places—and then go out and join in the fun. Some merchants already have built sectional board walls which can be erected in a few moments to protect their plate glass windows against pressure of celebrating throngs. Movies and taverns are planning similar action.

DALLAS, Ore., Aug. 1 (AP)—Paul Launer loaded his two sons' bicycles on a trailer and hauled them halfway to Salem, 15 miles away, telling them they would have to pedal the rest of the way because he was short of gasoline. However, when he was ready to return he couldn't find the car key, so he borrowed one of the bikes and wheeled himself all the way back for another key. Launer decided he just couldn't get ahead of the rationing system.

Travel Restriction Relaxed In Alaska

SEATTLE, Aug. 1 (AP)—The army's Alaskan department announced that, effective today, permits would not be required for civilians leaving or traveling within the Alaska mainland Kodiak island or southeast Alaska. Travel control restrictions remain in force in the Alaska peninsula beyond Beharof lake, south of Naknek, and in the Aleutians.

Draft of Men Over 25 to Resume

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1 (AP)—State draft directors have been ordered to resume drafting men over 25 who are making no contribution to the war effort. The order, selective service officials said today, took the form of a letter from Draft Director Lewis B. Hershey directing them to conform to the national policy.

Hirabayashi Weds Quaker Girl

SPOKANE, Wash., Aug. 1 (AP) Esther Schmo, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Schmo of Seattle, and Gordon K. Hirabayashi, Japanese-American youth who gained nationwide attention by bringing a test suit challenging government evacuation orders, were married Saturday, they disclosed today. The father of the attractive white girl and S. Hirabayashi of Weiser, Idaho, the groom's father, sat side by side as the bride and groom stepped quietly into the Lidgerwood Evangelical church for the first Quaker wedding to be solemnized in Spokane.

Barns Destroyed By Fire Near Albany

ALBANY, Aug. 1 (AP)—Flames believed to have originated from an automobile exhaust destroyed two barns and their contents valued at \$6000, investigators said today. The barns, on the Clay Henshaw farm near here, containing 40 tons of new hay, wheat and farm equipment, burned yesterday after a car burst into flames while parked in one of the buildings.

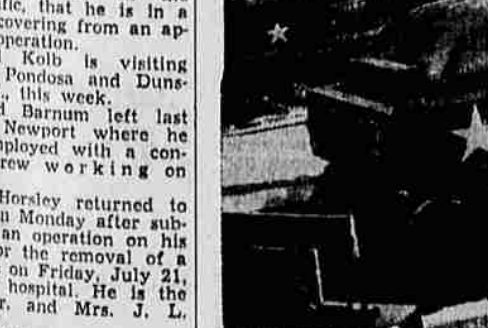
