

Dasso Wins Number 13 Over Stars

Padre Hurler Strikes Out 13 to Drop Hollywood to Tie For Third With Bevos

Number 13 didn't bother Frankie Dasso last night as he chalked up his 13th win of the season for the Coast Baseball League's San Diego Padres with a 9 to 6 triumph over Hollywood while striking out 13 batters.

Dasso struck out every Hollywood batter except Ken Richardson, who got three hits for five times at bat. The Padre hurler himself got three for three. The loss threw Hollywood into a tie for third place with the idle Portland Beavers who open today with a doubleheader at Los Angeles.

The San Francisco Seals reached Earl Porter and Gene Babbitt for 12 hits to defeat Sacramento, 8 to 4, and move to within a half game of league-leading Los Angeles. The Seals opened with three runs in the first inning and one in the third to send Porter to the showers. Two more tallies off Babbitt in the fifth clinched the game as the Seals pinched off a seventh and eighth inning rally by the Solons.

A seventh and eighth inning rally by Oakland paid off against Seattle, the Oaks coming from behind to win, 3 to 2. Oakland knotted the score at 2-all in the seventh inning after the Rainiers had scored singles in the fourth and fifth, then added the necessary clincher in the eighth.

Browns Boast Decisive 5 1/2 Game Lead Over Pack

Western Clubs Trounce Easterners In Fourth Intersectional Series

St. Louis boasted a 5 1/2-game lead in the American league today after brushing off eastern opposition in 11 of 16 starts to pace the western clubs to a decisive triumph in the fourth intersectional series of the season.

While the Browns operated on home soil, the traveling Cardinals wound up their second tour of the Atlantic seaboard with a fancy 14 of 17 win record as all western Nationals broke 500 or better.

Only the Boston Red Sox, who won 9 of 15 starts, upheld the honor of the east in either league with a few scattered games to be played before the clubs head home. Washington, winner of only one in 16 and loser of 11 straight, hit bottom with an .063 mark for the tour.
