TRUMAN QUITS POST ON WAR COMMITTEE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3 (AP)—Over the protest of committee colleagues, Chairman Truman (D-Mo.) resigned today from the senate war investigating committee.

Simultaneously with Truman's action, Hugh Fulton turned in his resignation as chief counsel of the group.

Truman said both republicans and democrats on the committee urged him to remain as chairman at a 40-minute closed meeting this morning but that he told them "it would not be fair to the committee, because everything I would say might be construed as political, in view of my candidacy for the vice presidency."

The democratic vice-presidential nominee made public a letter to Vice President Wallace, as president of the senate, asserting "I do not want even the shadow of suspicion that the committee's activities in any way are determined or influenced by political considerations."

Truman said the committee would meet again tomorrow to choose a new chairman.

Senator Hatfield (D-N.M.) and Mead (D-N.Y.) have been most frequently mentioned as possible successors to the chairmanship.

Prior to today's session, republican members of the committee said they favored Truman's continuance as head of the group.

MEMORIAL PARK MAY GO ON FALL BALLOT

Putting the proposed Veterans' Memorial park on the fall ballot was discussed at the monthly meeting of the Klamath Falls park board Tuesday afternoon. This will be put before the citizens for their approval some time in the near future. The issue involves the construction of a city park near

the Link river bridge and Lake Ewauna.

Plans were also discussed for the improvement of the grounds where the old high school used to stand, but it was decided to put that matter off until something had been done about the Veterans' Memorial park.

The board gave approval to R. C. Stott, caretaker at Moore park, to extend a stone fence and build another pond at the park.

QUALITY BEEF
RESTRICTIONS
ANNOUNCED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3 (AP)—Restrictions in sales and prices of some types of beef, other cable cord, were announced today by the war rationing board.

It explained the directives necessary because of military and naval needs, including the need for great quantities of beef for camouflage and the war food administration's requirements for beef.

Effective August 13 production of beef will be restricted to the amount of beef on hand at priority bases.

Applications to these restrictions include sales directly from producers to consumers who buy not more than 25 pounds of beef at one time, and deliveries made on October 1 on orders received before August 15 from the army, navy, maritime commission and war shipping administration.

Teacher Shortage to Close Schools

LEWIS, Aug. 3 (AP)—Although a teacher shortage is acute no school will be forced to close next year, D. A. Emerson, state education superintendent, predicted today.

He said that of the 8000 teachers in Oregon schools, 1500 hold emergency certificates to enable them to teach during the war.
