

RECORD BOMB ASSAULT HITS 7 HOSPITALS

LONDON, Aug. 3 (AP)—Flying bombs droned over southern England and London this afternoon in continuation of an unbroken 12-hour assault—the longest attack yet without a lull. Anti-aircraft gunners in southern England maintained almost continuous barrage. Some robots were reported destroyed over the English channel.

Seven hospitals were hit, 10 patients being killed at one, and explosions covered a wide area. One bomb wrecked a big house 50 yards from a shopping area crowded with women and it was feared—in the permissible phrase—that "there were a number of casualties."

One of the robots struck the wing of a hospital, killing two patients—one a soldier—and seriously injuring three nurses; the blast punctured a water tank on the roof and rescue workers were drenched to the skin as they dug among the debris in a search for victims.

Another bomb fell on a church which had been hit previously, and the explosion damaged a number of surrounding houses. The assaults continued on into the daylight hours and one area reported the heaviest attacks ever experienced in that sector.

At one point gunners destroyed two flying bombs simultaneously, one exploded aloft and the other diving into the water.

A second hospital was damaged by an explosion nearby, and many of the patients were evacuated, though there were no casualties. Damage to the building was estimated at \$600,000.

Marine Fighter Ace Killed

BAKERSFIELD, Calif., Aug. 3 (AP)—Capt. Edward O. Shaw, the marine corps' first ace fighter pilot of the war who downed 13 Japanese planes and was credited with several other "probables," was killed Monday during a test flight near Mojave, Calif., marine corps officials announced yesterday.

His fighter plane crashed when he was unable to pull it out of a power dive from 20,000 feet, the officials said.

The 24-year-old officer, formerly of Spokane, Wash., was the leading pilot of the "Hell Hawks," famed fighting squadron in the Guadalcanal campaign. He had been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross and Gold Star.

Wilson Opponents At Work Again, Says Dillin

McMINNVILLE, Aug. 3 (AP)—The same forces that defeated Woodrow Wilson's peace aims already are moving into position to block American participation in a family of nations after the war, President Harry L. Dillin of Linfield college told the chamber of commerce. A more lasting peace agreement could be obtained now than three months after fighting stops, he added.

PORTLAND, Aug. 3 (AP)—From 800 to 900 Mexican laborers will be assigned to the Independence area and about 500 to the Grants Pass district for hop picking late this month, the war food administration announced today.

disregard for his personal safety, Captain Ulrich extinguished a fire in another vehicle despite the possibility of an explosion of nearby gasoline, thereby saving valuable government property."

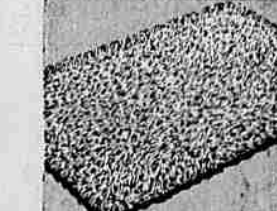
