## Pistol-Packing Russians Familiar Sight in Alaska

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Aug. 3 (CP)—A young pistol-toting officer, his pockets bulging with the large-sized pre-war American dollar bills, is a familiar sight on Fairbanks streets today. Citizens are beyond the eyebrow-raising stage because they've seen similarly-dressed men come and go for the last two years.

The officer, a Russian pilot and war hero, most likely is shopping for silk stockings, canned meats, jewelry and toys and other "luxuries" to fly back to his family and friends in west of the city, says most of the Russians he has seen "are here for a holiday."

"The majority, in Alaska on furlough from the fighting fronts, carry the one-star and two-star decorations on their tunics, which usually means they've shot down 10 or 20 planes. They get a star for each 10 planes down.

"They are free spenders. Their behavior is exemplary and they are always the perfect gentlemen. I think they're tops."

They represent nearly all walks of life, just like our own boys. They never talk about their homes or the war. These boys have seen lots of the war and are here to relax. The job of ferrying planes to Russia is just a breather for them after all they've been through."

## ICC Denies Request Of Low Shipping Rates For Lumber

SALEM, Aug. 3 (AP)—The Interstate Commerce Commission has denied a request by western Washington lumber mills to be allowed to ship by rail to southern California, Arizona, Nevada, New Mexico and Texas at the lower rates charged for such shipments from the Willamette valley, Public Utilities Commissioner George H. Flagg was announcing today.

Flagg protested to the ICC against the request.

Flagg said that before the war, the Washington mills were not interested in rail rates to those states because they shipped by water. But with coastwise shipping curtailed, they have to ship by rail.

## Cornflakes, Cream On Hogs' Menu

ALBANY, Aug. 3 (AP)—Cornflakes and cream and ham all in one serving are available to those who know where to get their ham.

An Albany meat company is fattening hogs on cornflakes and cream, but not at the expense of the war effort.

The cornflakes were purchased recently from a wholesaler who had on hand about seven tons of cornflakes produced a year ago, and no longer marketable to retailers. The cream is damaged stock, purchased several years ago from a milk canner when fire consumed the building in which the cream was stored.

Now the cream and cornflakes are mixed for the porkers.
