Another American spearhead pushed to Barenton, 24 miles southeast of Avranches and six miles beyond Mortain, lengthening the wedge driven between Brittany and Normandy, but pulled back slightly.

**Collapse Pocket**

U. S. first army infantry was rapidly collapsing a pocket formed by this spearhead and a British arm showed down to Vite from the north. Pushing through minefields the infantry captured one third of the St. Sever forest, Germany's biggest ammunition dump in Normandy.

Yet other forces advanced in rapid strides to within two miles of Evran, seven miles south of captured Dinan on the north side of Brittany, and jumped off to attack the German-held north coast city of St. Malo which had been bypassed in the strike to Dinan.

## General Boost Made In Property Taxes

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is 33.1. There was no district last year.

The increased tax rates are generally due to a slight reduction in the county's assessed valuation and to the special levies voted this year for post-war improvements of public property, it was explained at the assessor's office.

The total assessed value of the county's taxable property now stands at \$32,524,175.58, or about \$27,000 under last year's \$32,620,844.14.

Here is an analysis of the assessed values, with this year and last year's figures given respectively in each instance.

Land (includes timber), \$9,544,545 and \$10,005,395.

Improvements on land, \$6,753,375 and \$6,761,060.

Personal property, \$5,572,420 and \$5,544,435.

Total value, locally assessed, \$21,870,340 and \$22,310,890.

Less Soldiers' exemptions, \$39,930 and \$37,860.

Value of taxation (locally assessed), \$21,830,410 and \$22,273,030.

Public utilities (assessed by state tax commission), \$10,693,756.58 and \$10,347,814.14.

Grand total, subject to taxation, \$32,524,175.58 and \$32,620,844.14.

## DOUBLE TRAP CATCHES JAPS IN NEW GUINEA

thurs said today concerning late developments, "with an additional 602 enemy dead buried by our troops and the entire battle area littered with abandoned and uncounted enemy bodies."

The 602 made a total of 3870 Japanese dead listed since the breakout attacks opened July 12. When they began, MacArthur said an estimated 15,000 previously had perished due to "starvation, starvation and constant air bombardment and attrition."

**5000 on Tinian**

Added to all these dead were 5000 estimated by Adm. Chester W. Nimitz to have been accounted for by marine conquerors of Tinian over which the American flag was raised formally Wednesday.

Four thousand civilians have been interned on Tinian and 7000 on Guam.

**Two Miles Gained**

A Nimitz communique last night recorded two-mile gains Wednesday all the way across the north plateau end of Guam, from Tumon bay on the west coast to the vicinity of Pt. Sasayan on the east. Flying within 100 feet of the ground, carrier planes placed the attack, pouring bombs and rockets into fortifications and storage areas.

In the British New Guinea action, centered in the Drinimur river area between Wewak and Aitape, "the Japanese appeared to be shooting the works," reported Murlin Spencer, Associated Press war correspondent.

Carrying 75-mm. mountain guns forward on their backs and firing at point-blank range, the Japanese made four suicidal attacks Wednesday extending over 11 hours. Accustomed to such "banzai" charges, the Americans waited until the enemy was within close range and mowed him down.

Chinese troops have smashed into the walled city of Tengchung, main Japanese base in Yunnan province, and a battle with the enemy garrison is in progress, the Chinese high command reported last night.

Tengchung is less than 60 miles southeast of Myitkyina, main enemy base in north Burma which has fallen to the forces of Gen. Joseph W. Stilwell.

## CORDON TO SPEAK AT DINNER MEETING

U. S. Senator Guy Cordon arrived today in Klamath Falls which his democratic opponent in the fall election, Willis Mahoney, claims as his residence.

Senator Cordon is on a trip through southern Oregon before returning early next week to Washington, and will speak at a community dinner meeting at the Willard hotel tonight. The public has been invited to the no-host dinner, set for 6:30 p. m.

The talk tonight will be of a non-partisan nature.

Cordon was appointed to the senate after the death of Senator Charles L. McNary, running to succeed himself. Cordon defeated ex-Governor C. A. Sprague for the republican nomination and will take on Mahoney in the fall election. It will be Mahoney's third attempt to get into the senate, the first two having been stopped by McNary and Rufus Holman, respectively.

Reserves Rolled in

All along the 1000-mile front from the Baltic to the Carpathians, the Germans were reported rolling up reserves, particularly in the Warsaw and Vistula breach area. Concentrations of the German air force appeared in a desperate attempt to check Russian lunges.

The belief in Moscow quarters was that the Vistula breakthrough might be the start of a serious German rout.

The announcement said Artillery General Lindeman had "deserted to the Russians."

A Maj. Gen. Lindemann, commander of the 361st German infantry division, was reported by the Russians on July 23 to have been captured in Poland along with 15,000 officers and men.

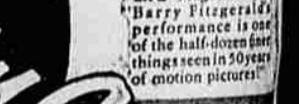

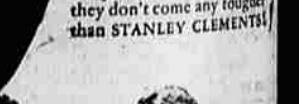

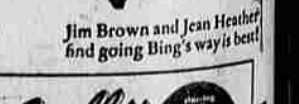
