Potato Growers Favor
Wage Ceilings in Basin

"We want a definite wage ceiling established and enforced on potato harvest wages this season." This was the unanimous request of a committee of 30 Klamath county potato growers at Henley, representing all major potato-growing districts last night. The request was made to Leo D. Hollenberg, executive officer, Oregon war food administration wage board, after considerable discussion.

Hollenberg explained that it would be necessary for growers to circulate a petition or secure signatures of at least 51 per cent of the potato growers asking the war food administration to come in and hold a hearing in order to secure all information required for the establishment of a fair and adequate wage ceiling on all types of labor involved in potato harvesting and shipping.

POTENTIAL POWER
OF RIVER GREAT

PORTLAND, Aug. 4 (AP)—The leader of a 2000-mile tour of the Columbia river course said yesterday the potential water power of the stream appears inexhaustible.

Americans and Canadians of a joint survey group made an extensive 19-day survey of the development possibilities of the river and its tributaries. A. O. Stanley, former governor and senator of Kentucky, headed the survey which he called the "most exhaustive survey made on any river."

Starting at the river's source in British Columbia, they traced its course through Canada, Idaho, Washington and Oregon with a side trip up tributaries into Montana.

Commandos Oppose Use
Of Armory for Center

Klamath Commandos, in a statement given the Herald and News today on the question of expanded quarters for their service center, declared that the Klamath armory is definitely unsuitable for the purpose.

"The Commandos are asking the people to consider the problem with which the community is faced, that of serving the servicemen to the best of our ability. We wish to explain why we cannot use the \$100,000 building, the armory, which has been much talked of as the building to be taken as a service center."

"It would take thousands of dollars to renovate the building, and it still would not be suitable. The partitions act as a partial support and could not be removed. This would cause inadequate supervision and since many servicemen try to bring under-age girls into the center, using a building arranged such as the armory would be increasing the juvenile problem rather than defeating it."

"Even though we spent a large amount of money for remodeling, the maintenance—heating, lighting and rental — of this building is tremendous. Any way in which it could be built over would not justify the cost of operation, because this building cannot be furnished or designed to create the homelike atmosphere the boys most desire in a service center. The appearance of the building is cold and unfriendly and without sunlight."

"In doing away with the present entertainment program being carried on at the armory, you throw onto the streets, not only several hundred servicemen, but several hundred teenage boys and girls who find the Wednesday and Saturday night dances major items on their entertainment program. The service center could not be opened to the public; the dances there are for servicemen, and the hostesses invited must be over 18 years of age. The wrestling matches on Friday night are always enjoyed by the servicemen and the civilian public."

"The armory is not conveniently located, in spite of the fact that it is on the bus line from

both the navy base and Marine Barracks. It is too far from the center of town. The service center is a headquarters for men, and when they have finished their errands made purchases, etc., it is to the center they go to meet their buddies, check their packages, kill time until the shows start, or the dance begins. They will not walk several blocks to reach the center and, if it is inconvenient, all your efforts are futile.

"Spending several thousand dollars for remodeling, doing away with the entertainment program which would have to be replaced by other activities, and overlooking the fact that it is out of the way for the servicemen, we are simply moving into another inadequate building, and taking headquarters from several civilian defense organizations such as the Women's Ambulance Corps, state guard, Sea Scouts and others. One of these organizations has said it will disband if evacuated from the armory. Do not overlook the importance of these organiza-
