

VFW CONDEMNS UNREASONABLE RENTS HERE

Resolutions condemning unreasonable high rents were passed at the Thursday night meeting of the Veterans of Foreign Wars. The resolutions are as follows: PELICAN POST NO. 1383 V.F.W.

RESOLUTIONS
WHEREAS a serious housing shortage exists in Klamath Falls, Ore., as proven by a survey conducted by the bureau of labor statistics during June, 1944, and

WHEREAS this housing shortage has encouraged a few unscrupulous persons to charge unreasonable rentals, although the vast majority of landlords have maintained a fair level of rents, and

WHEREAS the persons most harmed by exorbitant rents are service men whose dependents are living in Klamath Falls, and

WHEREAS many of these service men have already made untold sacrifices and shall be called on to make additional sacrifices, endangering their health, well-being and even their lives for the protection of our nation and of the American way of life.

Now Therefore Be It Resolved by Pelican Post 1383, Veterans of Foreign Wars, that this organization go on record as condemning those landlords who profiteer at the expense of service men and commending those landlords who are maintaining fair rents, and

Further Be It Resolved that this organization urge that prompt and effective steps be taken to bring about adequate rent control for the protection of service personnel and of others adversely affected by exorbitant rents which are being charged by a small minority of property owners, and

Further Be It Resolved that this organization urge all agencies having jurisdiction in the matter to expedite the provision of additional housing for service personnel and their dependents.

Two hundred lamb carcasses were spoiling daily in Portland alone, the growers said.

JAN GARBER TO PLAY FOR ARMORY DANCE

Jan Garber, known to millions as the "Idol of the Airlanes," who brings his orchestra to the Armory Wednesday, August 16, is the fourth of a series of name bands to be brought to Klamath Falls this season by "Baldy" Evans.

In spite of the tremendous following which Jan Garber created with his old sweet swing band, he recognized the current trend toward swing music, making it one of the finest swing orchestras in America today.

The present Garber organization is composed of 19 outstanding instrumentalists and artists, many of them from such fine bands as Orrin Tucker, Dick

Jurgens and Glen Miller, who were available because their leaders had been called into military service. He has, in addition, an outstanding staff of arrangers, headed by Morrie Rains, who is unquestionably one of the finest swing band arrangers in the country today, having arranged for Artie Shaw, Benny Goodman and many other top flight orchestras.

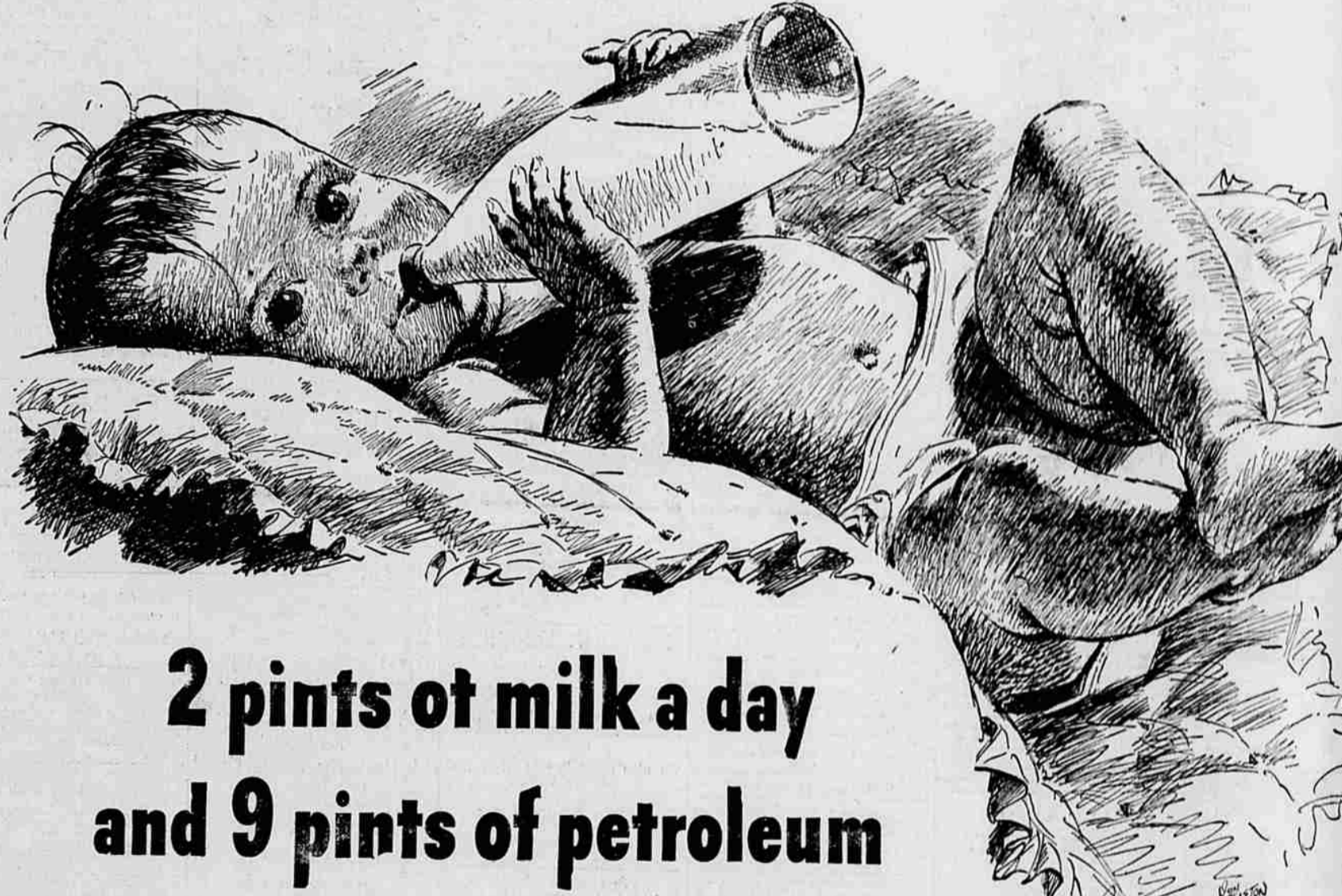

2 pints of milk a day and 9 pints of petroleum



1 In 1940, our last normal year before the war, the American people consumed 55 1/2 billion gallons of petroleum products. This amounted to 427 gallons per person—9 pints a day for every man, woman and child in the United States

8/10 cent x 427 = \$342

4 So someone has to furnish the petroleum to keep them going. In this country there are 8,267 individual oil companies working full time at this job. During 1940 they made a profit of 8/10ths of a cent per gallon on the 427 gallons of products you used—\$342.

2 By comparison, the people of Europe consumed 36 gallons per capita in their last peacetime year—1/14th as much—and the rest of the world 13 gallons per person—1/33rd as much. Since most petroleum products are used to power or lubricate machines, these figures will bear remembering.

5 The rest went right back into the costs of producing the products and getting them to you. Theoretically, if the government owned the oil industry, you would have saved that 8/10ths of a cent. (Same costs but no profit). Although there's never been a government bureau yet that was run as efficiently as a business.

3 For they mean that the daily life of the average American is just about 14 times as mechanized as the daily life of a European. This may or may not mean that our life is 14 times better. But the fact still remains that we use the machines.

6 But it would mean the end of competition; of the incentive to constantly improve products and lower costs which has been the driving force of our American system; and, worst of all, of individual freedom. Under the circumstances, that's quite a birthright to sell for 8/10ths of a cent on the gallon.
