

DUCK HUNTING RULES RELAXED

Season Longer; Bag For Mallards Upped

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9 (AP)—Hunters may shoot more ducks, and over a longer period this fall and winter under relaxed hunting regulations announced today.

The open season will be 80 days, 10 longer than last year. The general daily bag limit for ducks remains at 10, but the additional bag of five mallards, widgeons and pintails, in the aggregate, is allowed. Thus, if a hunter kills more of those species in a day, his bag limit on all ducks is 15.

The fish and wildlife service, which drew up the regulations, refused to permit the taking of waterfowl by means of bait or with the help of live decoys, as urged by some hunters.

Dr. Ira N. Gabrielson, fish and wildlife director, said the more liberal regulations were due to the steady increase in the continental migratory game bird population. He said the increase in mallards, widgeons and pintails has been "notable," and since they are the species which do the most damage to crops, hunters will be allowed to shoot more of them.

This is "purely a temporary expedient" to help farmers, he said, and will not be continued beyond this season unless crop protection again makes it necessary.

Open seasons on wild ducks, geese, brant, and coot in the northwest will be as follows (both dates inclusive): October 14-January 1—Illinois, Washington and Oregon.

Regulations covering shooting hours and the number of shells permitted in guns are unchanged from last year. These permit shooting from one-half hour before sunrise until sunset (there are certain time exceptions in parts of Texas and Illinois) and provide that guns must be plugged to hold no more than three shells, including the one in the chamber.

The daily bag limit on geese and brant remains at two, but in Pacific coast states an additional bag of four snow and white-fronted geese, singly or in the aggregate will be allowed, and in most other states an additional bag of four snow and blue geese.

With respect to ducks, hunters will be allowed to include red-head and buffhead ducks in their bag limit to ten, instead of shooting only three a day as last year. In addition to other shooting, a hunter is allowed a daily bag of 25 American and red-breasted mergansers, which Dr. Gabrielson said have become so numerous they are a menace to fish propagation.

Only one wood duck may be included in the daily bag. Daily bag limit for coot is 25; for sora 25; for other rails and Callinules, 15 in the aggregate of all kinds; woodcock 4; mourning or turtle dove and white-winged dove, 10 in the aggregate of both kinds; and band-tailed pigeon, 10.

A hunter must not have in his possession at any one time more than 20 ducks in the aggregate of all kinds (except American and red-breasted mergansers, of which he may possess 25), and in addition 10 mallards, widgeons and pintails, singly or in the aggregate. He is limited to possession of one wood duck.

Possession limit for white-winged doves was reduced from 20 to 10 birds.

Mourning or Turtle Dove: California, Sept. 1-Oct. 12; Idaho, Sept. 1-Sept. 15; Oregon, Sept. 1-Sept. 15.

Band-tailed Pigeons: Washington, Sept. 16-Oct. 15.

Outfielder Paul Carpenter starred in the field and at the plate last night to provide the margin the Pacific Coast league Seattle Rainiers needed to defeat Hollywood, 3 to 2.

Carpenter cut off a Star rally that had tied the score in the seventh when he leaped high against the fence to pull down Francis Kelleher's long smash and strand two men on bases. Then he poled out a homer for the winning run in the eighth inning. Hal Turpin was credited with the win, allowing the Stars to nine hits while his mates pounded Ronnie Smith for 12.

The Portland Beavers battered Bob Joyce for 14 hits and racked up a quartet of unearned runs to win from San Francisco's Seals, 7 to 2. Roy Helsor, former Seal hurler, won the series opener with a six-hit performance.

The second-place Seals lost no ground to Los Angeles, however, as Sacramento won from the league leaders, 4 to 3. Gene Handley's single with the bases loaded in the ninth gave the Solons the margin of victory. Guy Fletcher limited the Angels to six hits in winning the contest.

Oakland took an early lead over the San Diego Padres and held it throughout for a 7 to 2 win as Damon Hayes hurled a four-hitter while three Padre hurlers were giving up nine safeties.

Turf's Biggest Upset Sees Twilight Tear Lose

NEW YORK, Aug. 9 (AP)—William Woodward's Vienna sprang one of the turf's biggest upsets today, coming from behind in the stretch to beat the odds-on favorite, Twilight Tear, by three-quarters of a length in the Alabama stakes.

The unexpected defeat for Twilight Tear, a 1-20 favorite, halted her winning streak at 11. Vienna, an entry with Thread O'Gold, ran last in the field of four until the head of the stretch when Jockey Jimmy Stout put on a rousing rally to pass the Brookmeade stable's Dare Me and his stablemate, Thred O'Gold.

Down the long stretch, Vienna and Twilight Tear, ridden by Buddy Haas, ran neck and neck, but it was apparent as the finish line neared that the Calumet filly, hailed as the horse of the year after her victory in the recent Arlington classic, was beaten.

Thread O'Gold who set the early pace with the odds-on choice, finished third with Dare Me fourth and last.

Vienna, previously beaten by Twilight Tear in the Coaching Club Oaks at Belmont on May 27, covered the mile and one-quarter in 2:03 3/5 and paid \$18.20. There was no place betting.

Twilight Tear was top-weighted under 128 pounds, compared to 114 on Vienna.
