

HERSHEY ASKS UNIVERSAL DRAFT SETUP

PORTLAND, Aug. 9 (AP)—The current selective service program of concentrating on 18 to 26-year-olds probably will satisfy the armed forces until victory, Maj. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, national director, said here in an interview.

Urging universal conscription, he asserted that many of the 4,000,000 men rejected for military service since the war began would have been fit to fight if conscripted at 18 for a year's military training.

"They could have been straightened out physically and mentally," he said. "Between 400,000 and 500,000 were rejected for illiteracy. . . . They would at least have learned to read. The thousands of neuritis rejected probably could have been turned into pretty good fighting men with the right kind of training."

Post-war universal military service could count on from 750,000 to 900,000 trainees annually, Hershey said. "If we want a larger army, we must have a professional army or hold the youngsters in service for more than one year."

Although he personally favors more than one year of compulsory military service, Hershey predicted the public would not accept a longer term. In any case, he said, policing of defeated enemies should be done by a professional army, not post-war draftees.

Gen. Hershey spoke at the launching of the Tanker Beacon Rock at the Kaiser Swan Island yard last night. Mrs. Hershey christened the vessel. They left for Salem today.

Tinhatters Favor Kitchens to Jobs For After War

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 9 (AP)—Half the women tinhatters in Portland and Vancouver want to go back to the kitchen after the war.

A survey of future plans of 29,553 women in this area's shipyards and 2000 women in allied war industries indicates that the post-war feminine labor pool won't be too large.

Personnel counselors report that about 15 per cent of the women tool-wielders plan to get married or return to white-collar jobs.

Fifty per cent will stay home. Some 25 per cent don't want to go on working "unless we have to."

Only a bare 10 per cent said they wanted to continue in industrial fields.

Emergency Group Organized

PORTLAND, Aug. 9 (AP)—Fifty representatives of haulers, farmers, feed dealers, dairymen, contractors and lumbermen organized the Oregon emergency truck tire committee for maintenance of essential transportation here last night.

E. W. Peck of Portland was elected chairman. He said the committee will urge additional manpower for tire manufacturers and will ask the army if it can release any tires from its stockpile.

PAPER DRIVE COLLECTIONS INCREASE HERE

Klamath county's volunteer collection of waste paper increased during July, with a total of 122 tons gathered, an increase of 94 tons over June's collection and the third largest amount to be gathered by any county in the state last month, according to a report sent out by the Oregon State Salvage committee. This amount is one-eighth of the total tonnage of waste paper collected in the state during June.

Ranking seventh in the state in the average amount of paper collected per person since November, Klamath county's increase per capita average is 22.1. Lake county averages 8.1 pounds per person of waste paper gathered during the nine months period.

Several other counties have collected between 30 and 50 pounds of waste paper per person, however, indicating that more than ten pounds per person or more than 180 tons of potentially available waste paper in Klamath county is not being collected.

Animated Map Shows Klamath Larger Than Portland

Always ready to boost Klamath county, Peggy Rakestraw, chamber of commerce assistant, made Klamath Falls bigger than Portland on the animated map of Oregon she drew recently for display purposes.

Except for that one disproportionate feature, Miss Rakestraw has drawn an approximately accurate picture of the state's rivers, mountains, highways and other topographical features; and colored cut-outs of Klamath fishermen, Grants Pass Cavers, Corvallis cows, etc., pasted on the map give a quick-glance view of the regional characteristics of the state.

The map is on display at the chamber of commerce.

WAR PRODUCTION ON COAST EMPHASIZED

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 9 (AP)—West coast production of airplanes, landing craft, 40 millimeter guns, aircraft carriers and 100 octane gasoline will be given particular emphasis during the remaining days of the war, Rear Adm. Clark H. Woodward, chief of the navy's industrial incentive division, declared yesterday.

Citing that production must pick up 10 per cent in the second half of this year and finish 1945 with an output equal to that at the end of 1944, Woodward expressed concern over the migration of workers from the Pacific coast.

The Puget Sound navy yard at Bremerton, Wash., needs approximately 4000 workers, while the Mare Island yard and Hunters Point drydock at San Francisco need 10,000 and Terminal Island at Los Angeles 6000.

Northwest Ahead Of California In Victory Gardens

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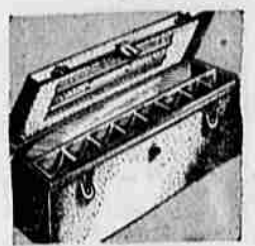
