Early in the morning they were preparing to move toward the last tip of land held by the enemy. The Japs were in the grass and sugar cane in front of their guns. "They banzaid," screamed, and yelled as they charged," said Pvt. Frazier, "so we dropped a few at long range." The action took place on the northwest beaches of this island. A crack regiment of second marine division sent into this area for the final drive after its capture of Garapan, had forced the Jap defenders into the caves and sand at water's edge.

The grange also urged that "no measure which would in any way restrict or hamper the public power movement be enacted by congress but, on the contrary, should any further federal action be taken, it be to strengthen and extend the public power program so that through power at cost, competitive private industry be stimulated, to the end that we may have in the Pacific northwest the better balanced economy and increased peace-time employment so necessary to our continued prosperity and progress."

WORK STOPPAGES KEEP 28,000 IDLE

By The Associated Press. Work stoppages account for more than two-thirds of approximately 28,000 idle today labor disputes in the United States and Canada.

These four involving some 800 were: The plants of General Motors' midwest over-the-road drivers in at least four and eight states, an estimated 5000; Wright Aeronautical operation, three Paterson, N. J. plants, at least 3000; Montreal, C. tramways strike, 4000. Six thousand more were idle in other disputes across the continent.

Alberta Returns Cabinet to Office

EDMONTON, Alta., Aug. 9 (AP)—The province of Alberta's social credit government and all nine members of its cabinet were returned to office in Tuesday's vote. The social crediters, led by Premier E. C. Manning, carried on the assurance they would continue their drive for reform started in this province by the late Premier William Aberhart, who led them to victory in 1935. The still incomplete count indicated the social credit majority in the next legislature would be greater than in 1940, when the party elected 36 members compared with 19 for the next longest party, the Independents.

Successful completion of the course will see the bluejacket graduate with the petty officer rate of motor machinist's mate third class, or receive recognition as eligible to qualify for that advancement.

Marine Sergeant Kenneth D. Wright, 25, husband of Mrs. Mabel Wright, 126 Payne, Klamath Falls, is recovering from a tropical ailment at the Marine Barracks here, following his return from the Pacific.

A member of the marine artillery outfit which fired the first shell into Jap installations on Bougainville Island, Sergeant Wright said he was "more scared and excited" during bombing raids than in the ground fighting he did against the Japs.

"The Japs went after us a number of times after we had made our beachhead at Bougainville," he said, "and the bombs dropping from their planes really scared me."

"Bougainville lacked a lot of being a summer resort," the sergeant stated. "It was hot, clammy, insect-ridden, and the water and mud in the swamps made life miserable much of the time."

Sergeant Wright spent 21 months overseas, serving on Guadalcanal, Samoa and New Zealand. He enlisted in October, 1936.

LAWSON FIELD, Ft. Benning, Ga. — Pvt. Thomas M. Lehmann, a veteran of the Aleutian-Alaska campaign, has been authorized to wear the bronze star on the Asiatic-Pacific theatre ribbon, it was announced by Lt. Col. John E. Alcorn, commanding officer, Lawson field, a base of the U. S. Army Air Forces I troop carrier command. The Bronze Star is awarded to any person who, while serving in or with the army of the United States on or after December 7, 1941, distinguished, or has distinguished himself by heroic or meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy of the United States.

Pvt. Lehmann has been a member of the army air forces since his entrance on December 11, 1941. He is the son of Leo Lehmann, of Baldwin hotel, Klamath Falls, Ore.
