

# MEMORIAL SET FOR GARRETT AT TULELAKE

TULELAKE — A memorial service for the late Eugene Garrett, machinist 1/c of the U. S. navy who lost his life in the recent disaster at Port Chicago, Calif., is planned for Sunday morning, August 13, at the usual worship hour, it was announced this week by Rev. Hugh Bronson, pastor of the Tulelake Community Presbyterian church. The young man, only local service man to be lost or injured in the explosion, was the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Garrett. His body was not found.

Eugene was widely known in the community and during his life here was deeply interested in young people of his own age and in his work as a machinist. He attended the Tulelake high school prior to enlisting in the service and only a few days before his passing had spent his furlough here with his parents and a sister. An older brother, Elmer, is serving with a transport command.

Tulelake Cadettes will attend the service in a body and other civic organizations of Tulelake will be represented. Special musical numbers are planned. Rev. Bronson will bring the message.

## Pinball Tax Money Distributed

SALEM, Aug. 11 (AP)—The first distribution of receipts from the pinball tax was made by the state department today, \$3261 going to counties and \$4891 to the state. The money is used for old age assistance. The amounts distributed to counties varied from \$2.60 to Jefferson county to Multnomah county's \$1261. The \$260,000 collected in the year ended June 30 has not been distributed.

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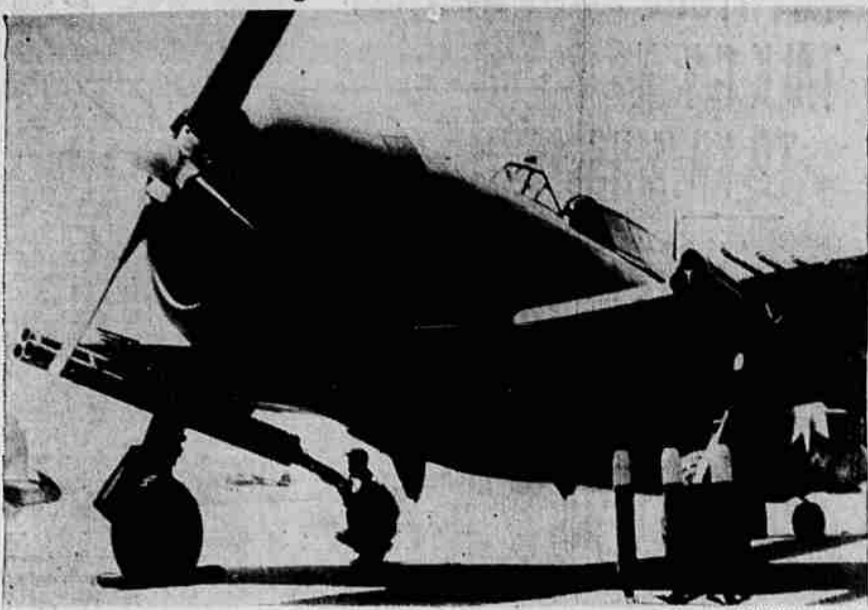
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## Rocket Firing Thunderbolt Packs a Wallop

## Ranks of Idle Men Drop Off as Labor Controversies End

By The Associated Press. The number of workers idle because of labor disputes dropped abruptly today with the ending of one of the nation's major controversies. The total still idle was between 55,000 and 58,000. Employees at four Paterson, N. J., area plants of the Wright Aeronautical corporation voted last (Thursday) night to return to work today after company and CIO-United Auto Workers representatives agreed to arbitrate grievances. The company said 7000 were off the job; the union placed the number at 20,000.

The government may "at any moment" take over in the mid-west truck drivers strike. Attorney General Francis Biddle said at Seattle, Wash. In this dispute over alleged non-compliance by the Midwest Operators association with a war labor board wage increase order. The army estimated 25,000 were idle.

The area affected embraced Iowa, Nebraska, Minnesota, Missouri, Kansas, North and South Dakota, and northwestern Wisconsin. In addition a "sympathy walkout" ended truck shipments out of Tulsa, Okla. An operators' spokesman estimated 3000 were out there but the AFL-Teamsters union figured it at only about 300.

Another and similar trucking dispute ended when 774 AFL drivers in the York-Harrisburg, Lancaster, Pa., area agreed to

immediate resumption of work, after the army indicated it would take control. In Detroit the CIO-United Automobile Workers arranged a mass meeting tonight in an effort to end a stoppage of 7000 at the General Motors Chevrolet gear and axle division. The war labor board after a hearing in Washington yesterday ordered the walkout ended immediately so production of aircraft engines, tanks and heavy trucks could proceed.

The politicians in Washington are almost as jumpy as the speculators in New York. They sprang a post-war government-pay-everybody bill a while back providing \$35 a week for war workers and \$25 a week for members of the armed forces. The bill reflected the politicians' opinion THEN that the war worker vote will be more important this fall than the soldier vote.

Now they're not so sure, and a movement is on foot to EQUALIZE the pay.

HAVING to guess which way the cat is going to jump is a tough job for speculators and politicians alike.

A WHILE back, when the politicians were unclear in their minds as to how the soldier vote might go, they adopted a lot of absurd rules LIMITING what the soldier might read with the result that now the service man isn't allowed to read much of anything. (They don't even let him read British newspapers, fearing that he might get some American political poison at second hand.)

Aren't politicians funny!

ALONG that line, the New Dealers must be getting scared that their followers won't take the trouble to vote this year. Representative Barry, DEMOCRAT, New York, proposes a bill in congress today to TAX everybody who fails to vote \$5—to be added automatically to his income tax!

## RELAXATION EYED ON NEWS CONTROL

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11 (AP)—Relaxation of tight official controls on the news, pictures and speeches may read, see and hear today appeared in prospect.

Interested senators and representatives of the services agreed on an amendment to the soldier voting law as applied to political propaganda. Congressional action will be pressed.

In the latest army application of the law, the "Official Guide to the Air Army Force" was banned from sale at post exchanges because it carries a pen portrait of President Roosevelt captioned "Commander-in-chief of the army and navy."

Under strict application of the soldier voting law enacted last winter to prohibit the distribution of political propaganda through official channels, the army has banned circulation within its jurisdiction of various newspapers, movies, books and speeches.

Agreement for a relaxing amendment was reached today at a conference among Senator Taft (R-Ohio), Senator Green (R-I.) and army and navy officers.

## BUMPER WHEAT CROP DESTROYED

GLENDIVE, Mont., Aug. 11 (AP)—Continuing reports from eastern Montana farming communities indicated today that a bumper wheat crop had been dealt a more destructive blow than previously estimated when a hailstorm battered a path 20 miles wide and 150 miles long yesterday.

The storm, beginning late Wednesday night and lasting into the morning hours, flattened upwards of 4,000,000 bushels of wheat and other grain crops, killed poultry and injured livestock. Some buildings were wrecked.

From Richland county came a report by County Agent Earl Bjork, who placed the loss in that county alone at more than 2,000,000 bushels. In Fallon county, County Assessor Oscar W. Rogers estimated the loss at least 50,000 bushels. Also hit were McCone, Garfield, Prairie, Dawson and Custer counties.

Previously, Glen Hicks, chairman of the Dawson county commission, said a conservative over-all estimate of the damage would be between 2,500,000 and 3,000,000 bushels of wheat. He based his estimate on partial reports.

NEW YORK, Aug. 11 (AP)—Wendell Willkie, 1940 republican presidential nominee, has been invited to discuss foreign affairs with President Roosevelt, two New York newspapers say.

The Times and the Herald Tribune reported that the president wrote a letter about July 13 inviting Willkie to a discussion.

Asked to confirm it, Willkie said "No comment."

### Favorable Weather To Assure Hop Crop

PORTLAND, Aug. 11 (AP)—The war food administration (WFA) predicted today that favorable weather in the next few weeks will assure the expected Oregon hop harvest of 87,000 bales.

The WFA said the crop, unfavorably affected by recent hot weather, improved during the past week under cool nights with some scattered showers.

The hop market in Oregon remained quiet, with no new contracts reported. Trade reports indicated that only a negligible part of the state's 1944 hops remain uncontracted.

### Mrs. Carl Nelson Dies In Salem

Word was received here today by Mrs. E. D. Johnson that Mrs. Carl Nelson, mother of Ensign Stuart Nelson, died in Salem early Friday. She had been ill four months.

Ensign Nelson left San Francisco by plane Thursday night for his home in Salem where funeral services were held Friday.

### OPA CHANGES MILL PRICE REGULATIONS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11 (AP)—The office of price administration in a revision of its regulation covering mill prices for Douglas fir and other west coast lumber today ordered uniform prices applicable to all mills.

Previous prices had been given to mills on an individual basis. The regulation change, effective August 14, will not alter price levels, OPA said. They include pricing of various items not included in the regulation.

Among clarifying changes is one defining use of rough weights and surfacing charges in connection with sizes surfaced on one or two edges only. Re-definitions of the terms "fob" and "combination grades" also were made because of varying industry interpretations.

### Close Cooperation of Chiefs Foreseen

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11 (AP)—Establishment of closest cooperation between General Douglas MacArthur and Admiral Chester W. Nimitz in preparation for coming offensives in the Western Pacific presumably was one of President Roosevelt's objectives in going to Hawaii.

The fight to split Japan's island empire has reached the point where Nimitz, Pacific area commander, and MacArthur, Southwest Pacific chief, will not much longer work in separate spheres.

The lines of their swift offensives, headed up now in western New Guinea and in Guam and Saipan, are approaching the point of convergence in the Philippines.

In a similar situation in the Solomon islands a year ago MacArthur met Admiral William F. Halsey, Jr., and by order of the joint chiefs of staff himself assumed strategic direction of the successful Solomons-New Guinea drives on Rabaul.

Assignment of their respective roles to Nimitz and MacArthur, being on a vaster scale and finally determining positions of leadership, was a delicate task which might well call for the prestige of the president himself. MacArthur and Nimitz are both topflight leaders and the general has not hesitated in the past to indicate his displeasure when affairs were not going to suit him.
