

REQUEST FOR AID MADE BY RED CROSS

The war department has asked the Red Cross for 100,000,000 surgical dressings a month. To help this demand, the minimum requirement in the Klamath Falls units has been set at 45,000 dressings a month. This quota was not met in July, according to Mrs. Carey Ramsby, county chairman of the dressing division.

Commercial manufacturers are able to make only a small per cent of dressings needed by the war and navy departments, as they have neither the equipment nor manpower for such an assignment. It is up to the Red Cross to make up this lack of surgical dressings needed for wounded men in all parts of the world.

In July, 413 women in the county made dressings and cut gauze. A call for 400 more volunteers to fold dressings was made Saturday by Mrs. Ramsby. Many faithful workers are in the seven units throughout the county, but more volunteers are needed, Mrs. Ramsby said.

Various chairmen and their staffs of instructors and inspectors give a minimum of six hours a week, in spite of being busy homemakers. They ask that the tables be filled every day with willing workers so that the monthly report sent in to the Pacific area office will show that Klamath county has met the assignment of 45,000 dressings, she reported.

The demand for dressings in the next few months will be higher than ever, and hope was expressed by Mrs. Ramsby that every woman will go to her nearest unit to fill the Red Cross obligation.

Washington Upheld In Ignoring OPA Timber Ceilings

TACOMA, Aug. 12 (AP)—U. S. District Judge Charles H. Leavy upheld yesterday the right of the state of Washington to ignore an office of price administration (OPA) ceiling for the sale of state timber.

Judge Leavy, a former democratic congressman, agreed with the state supreme court's ruling that the state's statutory requirement for sale by the commissioner of public lands to the highest bidder is the prevailing law. The supreme court recent ruling was in a 5 to 4 decision.

Ballot to Prisoner Returned by Censor

SEATTLE, Aug. 12 (AP)—King County Auditor Robert A. Morris said today an absentee ballot mailed from King county to an American prisoner of war held by Japan has been returned by the office of censorship with the explanation that to let such ballots go through might reveal information of use to the enemy.

Stating the ballot was being returned at the request of the war department, the notation read "... If certain military information required in this ballot were furnished by the prisoner, it would disclose the movements of our troops overseas, and aid the enemy... and thus prejudice military security. The transmission of this ballot... is not at this time practical or compatible with military operations."

Service Man Denied U. S. Citizenship

TACOMA, Aug. 12 (AP)—A member of the U. S. armed forces was denied citizenship here despite his military service. Federal Judge Charles H. Leavy ruled yesterday that Alexander John Baillie could not be naturalized because he did not want to forswear allegiance to Great Britain and stated that he did not intend to live in the United States permanently. He is a Canadian.
