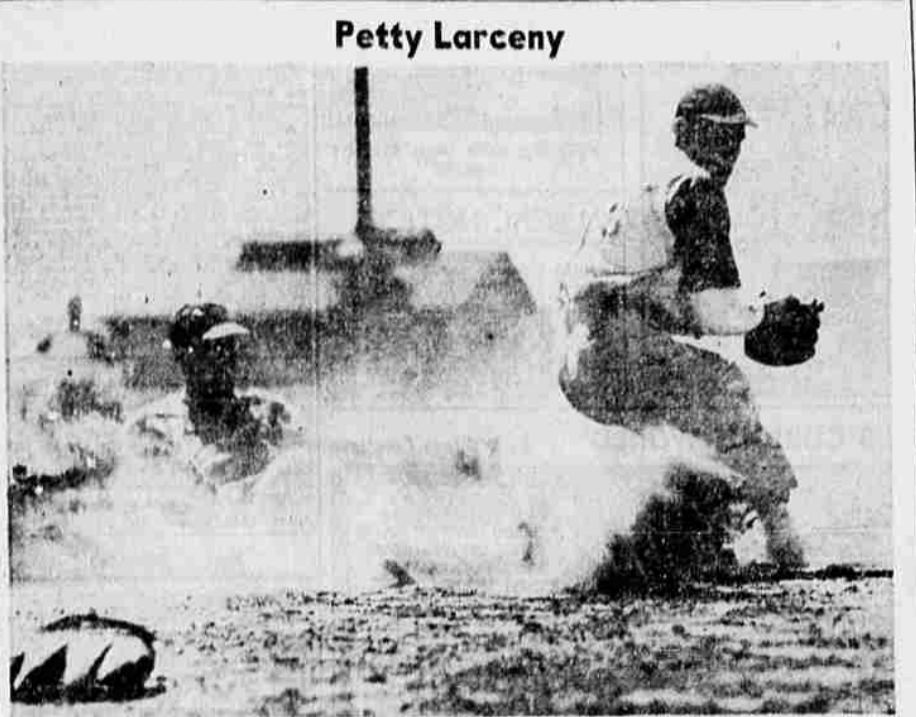


Averill Socks Home Run In Ninth to Give Navy 5 to 4 Win Over Marines

Earl Averill, Cleveland outfielder and American league batsman, fulfilled the crowd's plea of "be a hero" by socking the first hit of the night in the ninth inning. 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Trout Wins No. 19 With Victory Over Phillies

Dizzy Nears 20 Game Mark; Browns, Red Sox Split Double-Header Sunday

The hard-working Tiger twirler from Sandeul, Ind., yesterday achieved his 19th victory, more than any other major league hurler, when he blanked the Philadelphia Athletics 6-0 in the nightcap of a twin-bill, after the A's behind Don Black's three-hit pitching had defeated Hal Newhouser, also gunning for his 19th win, in the opener 6-1. The Tiger defeat in the first game ended a nine-game winning streak, one shy of the league's high mark set by the St. Louis Browns.

Besides winning the most games, Trout has pitched the most complete games in the majors, 22. The most innings, 245, and tied with four other hurlers in hurling the most shutouts in his league, three. Incidentally, all of his shutouts have been against the A's. Trout's high total of innings pitched puts him in line to better the "modern" mark of 343 innings set by Feller in 1941.

Ed Walsh of the Chicago White Sox set the all-time record of 464 innings in 1908, when he won 20 games.

The victory was Trout's fifth straight and his 11th in his last 12 games. In 27 starts, he has been taken out of the box only five times.

The league-leading St. Louis Browns and runner-up Boston Red Sox divided the first two games in their "crucial" four-game series, the Red Sox winning the opener 7-6 in 13 innings, and the Browns taking the abbreviated nightcap 6-1, cut to five innings by the Massachusetts 7 p. m. curfew law.

Rex Cecil, 27-year-old hurler from San Diego, hopped off an airplane and pitched the last four innings for the Red Sox, giving up four hits and no runs. He is credited with his first major league victory when Bob Doerr hit his fifteenth home run with one out in the 13th. The Browns second game win enabled them to retain their six and a half game margin.

Max Lanier gained his 15th victory of the season and his fifth over the Dodgers in the opener as the league-leading St. Louis Cardinals took two games from Brooklyn 4-1 and 7-3. Harry Brecheen got credit for his 11th win against two defeats in winning the second game.

Rip Sewell won his 12th and Fritz Ostermueller annexed his 10th victory of the season as the Pittsburgh Pirates swept a twin-bill from the Boston Braves 8-1 and 3-1 for the Bucs' fifth and sixth straight win. Frank Colman hit his fourth homer in five games to win the second contest.

The New York Yankees and Chicago White Sox exchanged drubbings as the Yankees won the opener 10-1 and the White Sox came back to take the second 11-3. Russ Derry of the Yankees joined a select group of seven American leaguers when he hit a grand slam home

Bevos Win Seventh From Seals

Ducks Take Whole Series To Topple San Francisco From Second to Bad Fourth

The Portland Beavers won their seventh straight game from the San Francisco Seals yesterday, topping the Seals during a disastrous week's series from a close second to a poor fourth in Coast league baseball standings.

The Beavers narrowly squeezed through a 4 to 3 win in 14 innings of the day's opener to keep their record clear but had less difficulty taking the nightcap and series final, 3 to 0, in seven innings.

Hollywood, meanwhile, moved into second place with a double win over Seattle's Rainiers, 11 to 4 and 10 to 3. The victories gave the Stars a 5 to 2 series edge over the Rainiers.

San Francisco snapped its streak of 36 runless innings by scoring in the first frame of the opener with Portland. The Beavers knotted the score at 3-all in the ninth. The winning run was scored in the 14th without benefit of a hit, combining a walk, an error and a fly for the crucial tally. Ad Liska scored his second series shutout in the nightcap.

Hollywood showed hitting power pounding out 10 runs in the sixth inning of its game with Seattle. Frank Kelleher of the Stars gained his 17th and 18th homers of the season.

Los Angeles lost a chance to duplicate Portland's series sweep by dropping an opening game to Sacramento, 2 to 3, as Gene Babbitt held the Angels to six hits. The Angels took the second game, 6 to 3, for a 6 to 1 series margin.

San Diego swept its double-header with Oakland, winning the opener 4 to 0 behind Frankie Dasso's seven-hit pitching and the nightcap, 7 to 2, as Oakland booted the ball four times on four sure kills.

Seattle Players Suffer Knife Cuts In Street Battle

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 14 (AP)—Two Seattle baseball players were taken to General hospital with knife wounds early today after reporting to police that they were cut by two assailants on a downtown street corner.

Radio Patrol Officers J. M. Doctors and R. E. Brown reported that William Derflinger, 24, center fielder, and Gene Holt, 23, southpaw pitcher, said two negroes approached them as they were laughing and talking. The ball players said the negro made some remark about "objecting to ridicule," then slashed them with knives and fled.

Holt was treated for a four-inch laceration of his left arm and Derflinger for a similar wound of his left arm. They received other small cuts and Derflinger incurred a leg wound.

The Seattle club completed a series yesterday with the Hollywood Stars.

OPA to Cut Motor Boat Gas on Oct. 1

SEATTLE, Aug. 14 (AP)—Operators of motor boats may go on reduced gasoline rations effective October 1, office of Price Administration Director Arthur J. Kraus announced today.

Under the proposed regulation, inboard motor boats will be limited to two gallons per horsepower for any three months period with a limit of 24 gallons. Outboards will be held to 2 1/2 gallons per horsepower with a maximum 10 gallons quarterly.

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Big Frank Visits K. Falls On Furlough From Marines

Big Frank Ramsey, former KUHS coach, was back in Klamath Falls over the weekend resplendent in his Marine Corps uniform (see picture), slightly thinner but not enough to cause anybody any worry, and generally not changed from when he left in June.

Ramsey, who is all finished with his boot camp training, flew up to Klamath Falls Thursday night where he met his wife and two children. He is to be stationed at the marine air base at El Toro, Calif., near Santa Ana and he will be taking a combat conditioning course given by Col. Dick Hanley, former coach at Northwestern, who is head of the entire marine conditioning program.

At the end of four months Ramsey will be stationed at Camp Pendleton, Ore., where he will be an instructor in hand-to-hand combat.

While he is stationed at El Toro, Ramsey said that he will probably be playing football on the El Toro camp team. The team, probably to be coached by Col. Hanley, will have such grid greats as Wiley Wilken, Dick Evans and Bernard Smith playing on it. Wilken played for the Washington Redskins before joining the service while Evans played for the Detroit professionals. Smith was standout center for Tulane and will probably play the same position for the El Toro eleven.

Ramsey said that, according to the information he had received from Hanley before he came up here, the marine team will be one of the strongest on the Pacific coast. They plan to play college and other service teams. Ramsey will play tackle on the team.

Big Frank said he was very much impressed with the discipline of the Marine Corps. He said he had never seen such order.

"The whole Marine Corps is the best organized unit I have ever come into contact with," Ramsey said.

"One thing I like about the marines," stated Ramsey, "is that every guy, whether he is an officer or enlisted man, has to go through exactly the same training. They are the strictest, hardest bunch of men I ever saw," the former mentor concluded.

Ramsey left Sunday to return to Grants Pass where his wife is living at the present time.
