

# Klamath Gets 5th Place in Oregon In E Bond Sales

Klamath county in the fifth war loan ranked fifth in the state in E bond sales, third in sales to individuals, 27th in sales to corporations, and 15th in total sales.

This is shown in a final tabulation from the Oregon war finance committee and the treasury department received by Joe Hicks, fifth war loan drive chairman.

Klamath's E bond sales hit \$1,331,000, or 134.6 per cent of quota. Counties which ranked Klamath in E bond sales were Hood River, Grant, Baker and Harney, all comparatively small-population counties with quotas ranging from \$118,000 for Grant to \$378,000 for Baker. Klamath's E bond quota was \$989,000.

Here is the summary of Klamath county's standing in final tabulations:

E bonds—sales \$1,331,000; quota \$989,000; per cent of quota 134.6; rank fifth.

Sales to individuals (including E's) sales \$2,489,300; quota \$1,289,000; per cent of quota 193.9; rank third.

Sales to corporations—Sales \$2,695,800; quota \$2,526,000; per cent of quota 106.7; rank 27th. Total sales—Sales \$5,185,100; quota \$3,815,000; per cent of quota 136.2; rank 15th.

Adjoining Lake county ranked first in sales to individuals, but dropped to 15th in E bond sales. In total sales, however, Lake was way up there in fifth place.

Here is the Lake county summary:

E bonds—Sales \$245,400; quota \$206,000; per cent of quota 119.1; rank 15th.

Sales to individuals (including E's)—Sales \$507,900; quota \$234,000; per cent of quota 217.1; rank first.

Sales to corporations—Sales \$268,200; quota \$271,000; per cent of quota 99; rank 30th. Total sales—Sales \$776,100; quota \$505,000; per cent of quota 153.7; rank fifth.

## MONUMENT HONORS LT. STEPHENSON

A monument is being erected at Camp Lee-Stephenson in Maine, in memory of Lt. (jg) George Stephenson of Klamath Falls and Lt. Irwin W. Lee, the first two officers of the civil engineer corps to give their lives in combat while serving with a United States naval construction battalion.

The camp was named in honor of the two men and now the monument is being built to be placed near the main gate of the camp. It will be built of concrete faced with a memorial plaque, 35 by 45 inches.

Lt. Stephenson was the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Stephenson, formerly of this city and now living in Ashland. He was killed in action in the Solomons in July, 1943.

# 'Fastest Gol-Darned Sawyer in World' Issues Challenge for Log-Cutting Go

"I'm the fastest gol-darned sawyer in the world!"

That's the boast of Louie DeLine (Cannonball Louie) of John Day, Ore., who was in Klamath Falls last weekend to look over local sawmills and down his nose at local sawyers.

"Nobody here can touch me," said Louie. "What's more, I'm willing to prove it."

"I'll come here any time, and saw for an hour or a day or what have you against anybody, taking the logs as they come."

"I'm the fastest gol-darned sawyer in the world, and I'll stake a lot of money on myself."

Louie left the challenge with The Herald and News, and anybody interested in taking him up can write him direct at John Day or contact the newspaper editorial office.

Louie called a local newspaper man at 8 a. m. Sunday. His identification over the telephone was taken a bit skeptically, but that didn't faze him.

"I'm Cannonball Louie DeLine, the fastest gol-darned sawyer in the world!" said Louie over the phone. "Come down and we'll talk things over."

The newspaper man, suspecting a ruse by some local acquaintance who hadn't reached the Sunday morning hangover stage yet, refused to budge from his house.

"Oke, I'll come out," said Louie.

He came, in a taxicab, and sat in the pleasant shade on the lawn while he spun his boastful yarns.

"This sawing is second nature with me," said Louie. "When I was 13 years old, back in Michigan, I got a job as nightwatchman at a mill. I kept steam up all night and played with the shotgun feed and the nigger. That early training made me the fastest gol-darned sawyer in the world. I'm the best nigger operator in the world."

## COMMITTEE OKES PATTON PROMOTION

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (AP)—The senate military committee voted unanimously today to recommend confirmation for promotion of Lt. Gen. George S. Patton Jr., to the permanent rank of major general.

The action had been predicted earlier by Senator Chandler (D-Ky.).

The committee, which had held up the nomination since last October because of a soldier slapping incident during the Sicilian campaign, acted after Patton's leadership of the American third army in Normandy and Brittany was announced by General Dwight D. Eisenhower at a command post in Normandy.

## 91-Year-Old of Boston Stays On Job Despite Heat

BOSTON, Aug. 15 (AP)—It was not the 96 degrees of heat that irked John A. Dorothy of the Mattapan district of Boston.

PORTLAND, Aug. 15 (AP)—The day Germany falls, state liquor stores will close in Oregon cities where other retail stores stop business to celebrate.

The Portland retail trade bureau has announced its members will suspend business that day.

The Oregon liquor control commission made the decision at its monthly meeting yesterday and announced it will take adequate precautions against any disturbance that might endanger its liquor stocks. Liquor stores will remain open in areas where business houses do not close.

## Tito's Forces Take Five Towns

LONDON, Aug. 15 (AP)—Marshal Tito's Yugoslav army has smashed out in a new attack 35 miles west of the Italian border in Slovenia and captured five towns, a communique broadcast by Tito's headquarters announced today.

Among the towns captured were Gornjograd, 20 miles northeast, and Smartno, 15 miles east of the rail junction of Ljubljana.

# Oscar Baker Bunch, Pioneer Of Fort Klamath, Passes

Funeral services were held at Fort Klamath Monday for the late Oscar Baker Bunch. The passing of Oscar Bunch takes a pioneer, a man who knew the country before the railroad; in fact, he drove stage between Klamath Falls and Fort Klamath in the early nineties. Later he operated a livery stable; where now an automobile or truck covers the distance in an hour, he rented saddle and buggy horses that took a day and a half, good traveling, to make the same trip.

He "put up" the freight teams, staying open late at night to welcome such well-known teamsters as "Big Mitch," who might have aboard thousands of dollars sent by Jud Ager, of Ager, Calif., as "bolts and nuts"—this to thwart the hold-up men—and Ditsworth, who raised and peddled the only green vegetables and fruits. These he hauled all the way from Dead Indian or Medford. The lives of such men were mellowed by these hardships and experiences.

He kept a cutter and fast team of Hamiltonians for the special purpose of bringing the Agency doctor for emergency cases. He had an old-fashioned foot-warmer in the rig, and while he started out garbed in a bearskin coat

in the below zero weather, generally the doctor or patient was wearing it before the trip was over.

Mr. Bunch married Fannie Loosley of a widely-known pioneer family. They had three children, H. G. Bunch, now a rural mail carrier; Lola, deceased; and Mrs. Loy Barker, whose husband has been affiliated with Klamath county schools until he went into training for the navy. Mrs. Barker, who was in Maryland with her husband, returned to be with her father.

He was an employe of the Chiloquin Lumber company of late years. The communities of Fort Klamath and Chiloquin will miss his kindly interest, as he welcomed progress and kept abreast of the times. It was recently said of him, "He numbered his friends by his acquaintances."
