Tom Ray Can Keep That \$10,000

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 16 (AP)—Tom Ray, deposed head of the shipyard-wealthy AFL Boiler-makers union, was authorized today by the membership to keep the \$10,000 gratuity which circuit court had ordered him to return.

A closed-door union meeting reapproved the gift made last November when a court order ousted Ray as business agent. Circuit court ruled last month that the \$10,000 had been illegally paid Ray by a governing board already deposed from office, and ordered the former union head to repay the money with interest.

WORD RECEIVED FROM WHEELING

Mr. and Mrs. Wheeling of Plaza, N. D., have received word from the war department that they had picked up a Tokyo radio broadcast with the following information: "Mr. and Mrs. Wheeling—'Hello Dad and Mother, I'm a prisoner of war in Japan. Am in good health and spirit. Please notify Wallace and Mildred, also my friends in Klamath Falls.' Signed, Walter F. Wheeling."

Wallace and Walter Wheeling, twin brothers, were employed in Klamath Falls previous to the outbreak of war, and Walter was reported missing two years ago. His twin, Wallace, was discharged from military service some time ago, in order to run his father's farm in Plaza, N. D., as the father is seriously ill.

A sister, Mrs. Mildred Brooks, also lived here until her husband, "Lard" Brooks, formerly employed by the General Petroleum, was killed in the Marshall islands in February.
