

CASUALTY LIST NEAR 300,000 MARK IN WAR

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17 (AP)—The casualties in the United States armed forces thus far reported to next of kin have totaled a total of 200,474.

The Secretary of War, McGeorge Bundy, today listed army casualties as 144,775 from the start of the war until July 29. Navy, air and coast guard casualties totaling 54,699 were announced by the navy.

The army total, 144,775, includes 113,977 killed, 27,806 wounded and 2,992 missing. The navy total, 54,699, includes 12,102 killed, 38,595 wounded and 4,002 missing.

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More than 800 American, British, French, Canadian, Dutch, Polish, Greek and Belgian warships, transports and other landing craft sailed from ports in Italy, Corsica, Sardinia, Sicily and North Africa to put their cargoes of men and machines ashore in southern France exactly on schedule under cover of terrific naval and air bombardment. German Troops Attempt To Ward Off French Raid

ON THE FRENCH-SWISS FRONTIER: Aug. 17 (AP)—About 1000 German troops, the last organized resistance group in the Savoie district of Haute Savoie, took up positions in Annemasse today in an effort to ward off French forces which are clearing the frontier.

A 39-man Nazi garrison at St. Gingolph, 30 miles northeast of Annemasse near the south shore of Lake Geneva, surrendered to a fighting French detachment which surrounded it at 10 a. m.

In this action the French, armed with light artillery, mortars and machineguns, routed the Germans from a hotel. (The absence in this dispatch of a mention of casualties suggested that the Germans gave up without a fight). Some of the patriots were men of St. Gingolph who returned after hiding since the Germans burned part of the town July 23. About 250 others came from Evian and Thonon, now fully under French control.

Advices from across the border said the Germans moved reinforcements to Annemasse from Fort Lecluse and barricaded the hotel Pax for the impending attack. The garrison also manned positions near the city hall.

But the partisans were reported holding the upper hand in the city, which lies about five miles southeast of Geneva, and improving control and manning frontier posts in other areas of Haute Savoie.

He said in a statement today that millions of men will return to this country through west coast ports and many probably will be met by their families, who propose to permit them to return to the housing projects while still in transportation home.

STATE GUARD UNITS TO BE CONSOLIDATED

The three units of the state guard in Klamath Falls are to be consolidated into one full-strength unit immediately, it was announced today on the occasion of the visit of Colonel Raymond F. Olson, state adjutant general.

Colonel Olson said it has been difficult to maintain full strength for the three companies, and that only one of them has been eligible to receive federal equipment.

Under the amalgamation plan, there will be no loss of commissions or ratings for non-commissioned officers. The consolidated company will receive full equipment.

Captain C. L. MacDonald will be commanding officer of the consolidated unit.

Colonel Olson, who was accompanied here by Colonel Ralph Cowgill, said that Governor Snell is much interested in the activities of the state guard and expects the Klamath unit to be one of the leading organizations in the state guard. The guard, he said, is the only force the governor can call on in case of disaster or other emergency.
