

CONGRESSMEN TO TRY FOR STABLE PRICE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19 (AP)—Northwestern congressmen formed a committee yesterday to try for "a stable market and price for cattle."

Headed by Rep. White (D-Idaho), the group, in executive session, discussed with Harry Reed of the meat section of the war food administration, the fears of stockmen that unattractive prospects for feeders will cause a glut of grass-fed cattle on the markets this fall.

F. E. Mollin, secretary of the National Stockgrowers association, telegraphed that the situation depended on the feed crops come through the mid-west drought and Leon Weeks, secretary of the Idaho Cattle-men's association said feed lot operators were not buying because of the high feed cost, a shortage of labor and concern over the end of the war.

War food administration figure, White told the committee, indicate that the nation's cattle population for 1944 will be 82,200,000 head or four to seven million more than we will have feed for this winter.

Members of the committee beside White are Reps. O'Connor (D-Mont.), Barrett (R-Wyo.), Robinson (D-Utah), Horan (D-Wash.), Mansfield (D-Mont.), Rockwell (R-Colo.) Holmes (R-Wash.), and Ellsworth (R-Ore.).

Doctor Shortage Blamed For Deaths In Portland Jail

PORTLAND, Aug. 19 (AP)—Shortage of physicians was blamed today by the city health officer as one cause of deaths among persons jailed on intoxication charges.

Dr. Thomas L. Meador, appearing at the mayor's hearing to determine cause of deaths in the city jail, said that laboratory tests are often necessary to determine whether a man's condition is due to injury or intoxication.

HARDWOOD USERS TO TAKE ALLOTMENTS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19 (AP)—Large consumers of lumber may take delivery on part of their fourth quarter allotments of hardwood during the present quarter, the war production board announced today.

The relaxation was ordered because hardwood production this quarter is running about eight and one-half per cent higher than was estimated when allotments were made, WPB said.

Maximum additional amount of hardwood which may be ordered and received in this quarter is the larger of the two figures calculated as follows: 20 per cent of the amount ordered before August 15 for delivery this quarter; or 20 per cent of the amount in the user's inventory when he filed application for fourth quarter lumber.

LOG TRUCK DRIVER ORGANIZATION ASKED

SEATTLE, Aug. 19 (AP)—Organizational disputes of jurisdictional disputes, the AFL Teamsters Union western conference unanimously adopted a recommendation yesterday calling for an immediate drive for the organization of drivers of log and lumber trucks operating on highways.

Dave Beck of Seattle, International Teamster vice president, advised conferees that any disputes between AFL unions would be a problem for the AFL executive council.

According to a report made by a recently formed log and lumber haulers' division of the Teamsters' Union, 18 per cent of the haulers are under CIO jurisdiction, 17 per cent are Teamsters and 15 per cent are members of the AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers' Union. The remainder are unorganized.

PEPPER LACK MAY LEAD TO SPOILAGE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19 (AP)—A lack of black pepper, needed to process and preserve meats, may result in the spoilage of millions of pounds of meat in the next half year, Rep. Andresen (R-Minn.) believes.

Andresen told the house yesterday that "a few importers" have gained control of the black pepper supply.

"More than 30 million pounds of black pepper, or enough to take care of all requirements to the end of 1945, is in storage but the owners refuse to sell at the ceiling price fixed by OPA," Andresen said.

He declared the OPA refused to act although millions of pounds of meat may be spoiled because of lack of pepper.

HEATH HEN NOW EXTINCT
