Efforts to recruit men for employment in other areas for employment in the lumber industry here met with no success, and it is all a serious labor shortage in all branches of the industry, reports the employment office here. Sawmill laborers and lumber handlers are especially needed.

There is a slight surplus of office clerks and typists because of the influx of service wives, but positions for stenographers are still being filled. The demand for construction workers is plentiful, but the demand for construction labor is greater than the supply of workers available.

Use of Navy blimps to help the fishermen—super-lookouts in super-crow's-nests—is a war assignment. When these airships are taken off other war duties to fish, it means fishermen and their services are important.

By supplying salmon and herring, tuna and sardines, calories and vitamins—both to the armed forces and the civilian populations—western fishermen from San Diego to Alaska are making history.

Yet, for fishermen, history-making is old stuff. The Vikings roamed the seas because of the fish. The Bible story of the loaves and fishes eternally recalls how close they've always been to all peoples.

Somehow, it's hard to quit thinking of fishermen as romantic fellows with venture in their blood, and appreciate the war contribution they've made by hard work and scorn of danger. Yet there is a way.

Let's just think of the difference it would make if the starved children of captive Greece could get their cod-liver oil. Let's remember that—thanks to the fishermen—the children of America do get it. Thanks to the fishermen!

THIS conference is participated in by the top hired hands of the three great powers. Later Stalin, Churchill and Roosevelt will get together to put on the final touches.
