

STATE GUARD COMPANY SETS WEEKEND CAMP

Overnight bivouac with equipment and simulating war conditions will be experienced by members of the 1st regiment, infantry, Oregon state guard, on Saturday night and Sunday, August 26 and 27.

Full field equipment, including a machine gun, will be used. The company will meet at the Klamath Falls armory promptly at 7 p. m. Saturday. Leaving the city at 8 a. m., the company will go to the woods where tents will be erected and the bivouac for the night.

The evening mess will be served at 7 p. m., after which the men will be at leisure until 10 p. m. when an informal guard will be mounted and field camp security practiced throughout the night.

Second Lt. Karl Urquhart will be in charge of this phase of the exercises.

Drumming will be sounded at 7 a. m. Sunday, with breakfast served at 8 a. m. Lt. Newton will act as officer of the day for the Sunday camp.

Capt. MacDonald will lead his company on a practice hike with full packs, starting from the camp at 9 a. m. Sunday. The men will carry a field lunch and will practice marching and troop security, as

well as other tactical problems while on the march. Returning to camp at about 3:30 p. m., the company will again entruck for the Klamath Falls armory where equipment will be checked in and the company dismissed.

JOHNSTON SAYS RED LIBERTIES VAGUE

SEATTLE, Aug. 23 (AP)—Eric A. Johnston, U. S. chamber of commerce president, described Russia as a land where "civil liberties are only a vague promise" and where, "if there is any religion, it is the worship of Stalin."

But, he said in addressing a crowd of 500 construction executives, Russia also is a nation of indomitable courage.

As an example, he gave this vivid description of war-blasted Stalingrad:

"Streets filled with rubble; occasional walls standing like tombstones of its great industries; volcanic bomb craters; all trenches like the paths of worms through rotten wood; Stalingrad will rise again, Phoenix-like, from its ashes, the landmark of the labor pains of a Russia reborn."

Throughout his entire travels, however, Johnston said "... I have rediscovered America. Never before did I realize the importance of our freedom, our standard of living, our right of habeas corpus, our bill of rights."

For the contractors, the Spokane businessman predicted that the "eyes of the world are on the Pacific coast. In the next decade or two the west will receive tremendous growth. It will be a great opportunity for the contracting profession."

OREGON WOMEN ENLIST IN WAVES

More than 1200 young women from Oregon are among the 75,000 WAVES on duty at 500 shore establishments of the U. S. navy in continental United States, according to Recruiting Specialist Dan Schreiber of the Klamath Falls navy recruiting station, which handles WAVES applications in this area.

WAVES in two years have replaced as many men in the navy's shore stations as would be required to man 10 battleships, 10 large aircraft carriers, 28 cruisers and 50 destroyers—approximately the size of the active peace-time navy of the United States.

The WAVES who have added this fighting strength to the navy are now performing almost every type of duty which the shore establishment of the navy needs.

More WAVES are needed to bring the total to the goal set for this women's reserve—100,000 by January 1, 1945. Women between 20 and 36 years, with no children under 18, who are U. S. citizens and who are in good health, are eligible for the WAVES. Women are invited to consult WAVES Recruiter Ivy C. Quale at the local navy recruiting station this week.

DALLAS, Aug. 23 (AP)—Sheriff T. B. Hooker said today he would go to Boise to bring back Elmer Lane and Malay Stone, Oregon state prison ex-convicts who are wanted in connection with the \$12,000 hold-up August 2 of the Grande Ronde State bank.

The two men are held in the Idaho capital on a federal complaint charging unlawful attempt to evade arrest. They were arrested in a Boise tavern last night, Hooker saying they

had \$9353 and a .30 caliber pistol on their persons.

State police arrested Mrs. Lane in Portland last night for questioning.

Lane served a prison term here for car theft in Polk county, while Stone served a sentence here for larceny in Multnomah county.
