SOVIET ARMIES CUT DEEP INTO ROMANIA

Romanian prisoners in a single day, and sent spearheads to less than 100 miles from Ploesti and slightly more than that from Bucharest.

Front dispatches said red army tankmen, as liberators and not conquerors, cruised through hundreds of northern Romanian towns and villages, followed by sweaty, dusty columns of singing infantry.

Red army political officers, carrying out the official Russian position, explained to Romanian soldiers and civilians that liquidation of German forces in the country must be achieved before military operations cease and an armistice can be concluded.

Civilian populations literally cried for joy on hearing of a second promise by the soviet government not to annex Romanian territory, change its existing social regime or harm its independence, dispatches said.

Tartu Taken

At the other end of the extended eastern front soviet forces captured Tartu in Estonia and edged within striking distance of the German bastion at Lomza in Poland, near the East Prussian frontier.

The 47,000 casualties announced at midnight brought to 853,888 the number of enemy troops announced as killed or captured in the Russian summer offensives since June 23. The 28th German general was captured.

The German communique told of the staggering military and political blow which was Romania's about-face in these words:

"In the southeast sector of the eastern front, our troops are disengaging themselves toward the Prut and Siret rivers. After parts of Romanian troops had ceased to fight, many enemy tanks were destroyed.

Moscow reported that Romanians, who previously had deserted, told advancing Russian troops that Germans machine-gunned them for retreating and that they, the Romanians, in turn, killed their nazt military masters.
