**Increase in Trade With China Seen**

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 29 (AP)—Greatly increased postwar trade between China and the Pacific coast was predicted here today by C. H. Wang, 39, newly-appointed Chinese vice consul.

A million miles of new highways and 10,000 miles of new railroads are planned immediately after the war "with the cooperation of our great allies," he said.

Increase in production and exportation by China of silk and tea were predicted by Wang, who left China two months ago.

## NATIVE OF COUNTY DIES IN BONANZA

Jackson (Jack) S. Horton, 73, who died in Bonanza last week, was believed to have been the oldest native resident of the county.

Mr. Horton was born in a log cabin on the old Horton ranch near Lost River in 1871, and had been a resident of the county ever since.

Klamath County was then a part of Jackson county and Mr. Horton witnessed many of the fights with the Indians in the early days. He raised cattle in this part of the country for many

years and later went into the logging industry. He has been retired for some time.

He is survived by his widow Mrs. Helena Mae Horton of Bonanza, a son, Lynn A. Horton of Mentone, Calif.; two sisters, Mrs. J. O. Hamaker and Mrs. Birdie Burk of Bonanza; and one brother, Charles Horton of Dorris.

**COMMITTEE OPENS SLUSH FUND SEARCH**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 29 (AP)—The house campaign expenses committee today began a drive to uncover "slush funds" and find out who contributes how much to the campaigns of candidates in the November elections.

Labor and industry will be called before the group. Yesterday the committee quizzed Sidney Hillman, of the CIO, political action committee and drew from him a vigorous defense of charges that the PAC is "communist-engineered from the top down."

Rep. Church (R-Id.) had made the charge. Hillman replied that Church was "trying to prejudice the public against us," and that he, Hillman, would put his record of fighting communism against that of Church at any time.

"I'm opposed to communism because I'm opposed to all totalitarianism—even in industry," Hillman asserted.

Hillman said the PAC is backing the Roosevelt-Truman ticket and seeks to elect a "progressive congress." He emphasized, however, that it will not contribute funds to the democratic national committee.

"For the farm home, trailer camp or defense project where ordinary refrigeration is impossible, the iceless refrigerator is an easily constructed convenience," according to Mrs. Winnifred K. Gillen, home demonstration agent for Klamath county, at whose office plans for this refrigerator method are available.

Plans and directions for construction of the iceless refrigerator have been received at the agent's office, 208 federal building.

It consists of a wire screen covered framework, with a hinged door and shelves for food storage. The framework is covered with a jacket of burlap, duck, or cotton flannel, and a pan of water with wicks in it is placed atop the whole. The framework stands in a larger pan into which the water seeps from the cloth covering which is saturated by capillary action.

Such a contribution toward keeping food cool and sanitary and palatable will be most welcome to any homemaker in the county who may be unable to buy other refrigeration because of war shortages, Mrs. Gillen believes. If the framework is painted white and the outer cov-

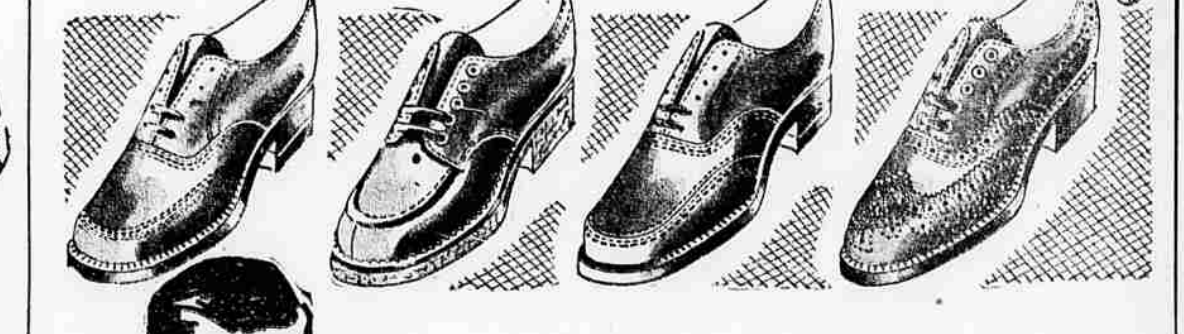
